**GROGERS SUMMONED FOR SELLING ADULTERATED COFFEE.**

The Inland Revenue Department Prosecutes—The Coffee Was Analysed and Found to Be Roasted Grain.

On a charge of selling adulterated coffee, two Kingston grocers have been summoned to appear in the police court, yesterday, by Constable Arniel, and the cases will come before Magistrate Farrell, Friday morning.

The complaint is made on behalf of the Dominion government, by the inland revenue department, and is under the pure local regulations. The charges are made as a result of an investigation recently carried on by the local food inspector, J. McIl. Motat will conduct the prosecution. It is some time since a case of this kind has been tried, and the results will be awaited with keen interest.

Samples of the coffee were collected by the food inspector, whose duty it is to forward them to the laboratory of the inland revenue department at Ottawa. The samples of the two accused Kingston grocers are reported upon by A. McGill, chief analyst of the department, as "adulterated," and as showing under microscopical examination to be just "roasted grain."

One of the accused grocers purchased his coffee from a wholesale grocery firm. The coffee sold by two other Kingston grocers is also shown by the analyst's report to be adulterated, but with chicory. The coffee sold in all the other Kingston stores is reported "genuine." The two accused grocers conduct small stores.

**SOME OF THE THINGS THAT THE COUNCIL MUST SETTLE.**

**Before it Adjourns For Vacation—The Fire Department Needs—Gramophone and Laundry By-Laws Hanging Fire.**

The civic fire committee will have a meeting to-morrow afternoon, to talk over with Chief Armstrong the needs of the fire department. The new chief has made a close inspection, and, it is understood, has a report to lay before the fire committee, giving his views as to what additions should be made to properly equip the brigade. It is pretty certain that he will ask more hose, so the committee will have to buy at least 500 feet this year, and likely a similar amount next year. Of course the committee has the question of a fire engine under consideration, and it may have a definite report to make to council on this matter next Monday evening.

The resignation of Samuel Hall, one of the older firemen, leaves a vacancy to fill, but the chairman and the chief have now the authority to make the appointment of a fireman.

The request of the firemen for more wages has to be considered, and the likelihood is that the committee will recommend a higher scale of wages. If the city doesn't pay its firemen more money, there'll be more resignations from the brigade, as the men are certainly underpaid.

**Finance Committee Business.**

The finance committee will have a meeting on Friday evening, to consider several matters before the council takes its holidays. The gramophone question still remains unsettled, and a solution seems difficult. City Solicitor McIntyre will have to be called into consultation by the committee, and he may be able to draft a by-law that will make everybody happy. A by-law cannot be enacted against theatrical gramophones alone. All gramophones have to be treated alike, and, according to reports, there are instruments in private homes that cause annoyance to neighbors.

The finance committee has also to provide \$500 for the garbage removal experiment. It will worry over the question, "Where will the money come from? Some arrangements have to be made for a reception to the Kingston Old Boys, on their arrival from Toronto and Ottawa, on the 24th.

The laundry by-law has also to be amended and presented to council. This by-law will likely be changed to provide for a five dollar license instead of one of fifty dollars, and a clause may be added as to the portions of the city in which laundries may be established.

**City Property Committee.**

A meeting of the city property committee has been called for this afternoon. Ald. Angrove wants to get another grant from the council in order to make necessary changes in the staircase leading from the rear of the city hall to the council chamber, so that the stairs may comply with the by-law respecting exits. The city certainly should comply with the by-law to which it expects the people to conform.

**Not Overdrawing Appropriation.**

City Engineer Craig says that the board of works has no intention of over-spending its appropriation. The work it has laid out will be done with the money it has on hand. The \$2,000 it has asked the council for is for extra repainting on the roads. If the council doesn't see fit to give the money the board of works doesn't care, but it cannot carry out the suggestion of Mayor Cooper to increase the road patching unless more money is given.

**Division Street Roadway.**

Three blocks of Division street, from Brock to Earl streets, have been rebuilt of limestone macadam, and the balance of the road to Union street will be completed before the end of the month. After that, Barrie street will be given attention, beginning with Brock street, and work will be continued as far as the \$3,000 board of works has for road building will last. At least three blocks on Barrie street will be built.

**The Taxes Collected.**

To date \$113,000 or about seventy-two per cent of the city's taxes for 1909 have been received by Tax Collector Bartola. Altogether there is about \$165,000 in general taxes, and this is practically all paid. Between \$30,000 more will be paid into the treasury department. After September 15th five per cent is added to overdrawing taxes.

**A Council Of Eight.**

It is suggested that if the city council wants to adjourn for holidays, it should appoint an executive committee of the chairman of the standing committees to have full power to sit as a council. This executive would consist of Mayor Couper and Alds. Angrove, Craig, Elliott, Graham, Rigney, McCartney and McCann.

**Must Cut Down Weeds.**

The city engineer is issuing notices to owners and occupants of vacant lots requiring them to cut down or have destroyed within ten days from service any noxious weeds now growing upon their property and in case of failure or neglect to do so they will become liable to a fine and in addition the engineer may enter upon their land and cut down or destroy any noxious weeds growing thereon and the cost of the same will be charged to the owner or occupant and be collectable in the same manner as ordinary taxes.

**Enters Protest.**

Ottawa, July 8.—The mayor of Glace Bay has sent a message to the militia department protesting against the sending of militia there to quell the strike outbreaks. The department, however, is satisfied that the men are needed and will take no notice.
