Paris, July 9.—If any hostess is eager for a diverting novelty and is willing to turn her house into a human aviary she might take a hint from the bazaar but brilliant ball given by the bachelors of Paris this week.

The affair was arranged by a group of the most distinguished male unmarried favorites of society by way of repaying their hostesses for the season's hospitalities. The scene was the restaurant Durand and the Pavilion de l'Elysee in the Champs Elysees, and the names of those in attendance would constitute a social register of Paris.

Not that you would readily have recognized the princesses and ladies of high degree of such houses as those of Orleans, Murat, Uzes, Rothschild and Montesquieu. For the men had discarded the decorous and unlovely habiliments of black and appeared glorified in raiment of scarlet, and purple, while the ladies moved in the guise of the brilliant picture as birds of brilliant plumage.

The Comtesse Pierre de Segonzac was a parrot in gayest green and crimson, Mlle. de Saint-Sauveur strutted in a somewhat vague resemblance to the red ibis, and Mme. Mauries Ephrussi played the eagle. HUNGER STRIKE IN JAIL.

Sigarette Refined Food For 11 Hours.

London, July 9.—The latest heroine of the suffragettes' cause is Miss Wallace Dunlop, who recently was sentenced to a month's imprisonment in the Holloway jail for posting notices on the walls of the House of Parliament. Miss Dunlop organized a hunger strike in the prison, and the authorities discharged her this afternoon, after she had refused food for ninety-four hours. Miss Dunlop had only been in prison five days.

Calls For Cleanliness.

Ottawa, July 9.—Rules and regulations have been issued by R. R. Hollingsworth, to the city veterinarian, and will be posted in all dairies and cow pens. They are intended for farmers and dairymen and give concise hints for the care of premises, of the cows, yards, the handling of milk and utensils. Cleanliness is the predominant note of the whole and, following the suggestions, will ensure a pure supply of milk.

Must Cease Illegality.

Walkerville, Ont., July 9.—A thorough investigation of hotel conditions in Sandwich East, by the Dominion Lord's Day Alliance, is promised as a campaign against the hotel by Father Beaudin, parish priest of the Church of Our Lady of Lourdes. Father Beaudin declares he will not give up the campaign until the number of licenses in the township is reduced and hotelkeepers cease to sell liquor on Sundays.

L. W. Bakewell Dead.

Clayton, N.Y., July 9.—A telegram announces the sudden death of L. W. Bakewell, who owned a cottage at Perry Point, on Grindstone Island, just opposite here. Mr. Bakewell was a Pittsburgh patent lawyer and was arguing a case in the court room when death overtook him. Mrs. Bakewell and her son, Alphonso, who were at the Bakewell cottage, are for Pittsburg.

Baseballers Fined.

Newburgh, Ont., July 9.—The members of the Newburgh baseball team, which played against Lonsdale, Sunday, June 20th, appeared before Magistrate Bedford, Breslerton, and were fined \$3 each. The Lonsdale players were fined some days ago.

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LARGEST EVER MADE

WEIGHS 1,950 POUNDS AND MADE IN UTICA, N.Y.

Took Ten Tons of Milk to Produce and Was Paraffined in Open Air—Shipped to Chicago.

Re-Measuring The Ramona.

Utica, N.Y., July 9.—A local cold storage warehouse company shipped to Chicago what is believed to be the largest cheese ever made. Its weight was 1,950 pounds. It took about ten tons of milk to produce it, and it was pressed into shape by a specially constructed press, by a Lowville cheese factory, where it was bought by the Chicago firm through the cold storage company. The company has shipped quite a number weighing as much as 2,000 pounds, but this was the largest one it ever tackled. It has a tank which is large enough to paraffin a half-ton cheese, but to-day the monster cheese was paraffined outside of the tank by carefully pouring the molten liquid over it. After the air-tight lid had cooled, the cheese was encased in a sheet iron covering.

A warrant has been issued for the arrest of Major R. G. Leslie, Sudbury, on the complaint of William Marshall, Montreal, on a charge of fraud in connection with a mining adventure.

John Piche, former Sudbury magistrate, charged with having accepted a bribe of \$25,000 to refrain from giving evidence in a mining suit brought by the provincial government, was remanded for a week
