DOCTOR LYING WOUNDED IN BELLEVILLE HOSPITAL.

Says He Was Robbed of \$600—Was Well Known in Ottawa, Where He Shocked Other Practitioners By His Methods.

Belleville, Ont., July 9.—Dr. Pelletier is in the hospital under treatment for a serious wound, which he claims he received near Havelock, where he was attacked and robbed by unknown persons while driving to see a patient. He says that \$600 was taken from him.

Well Known in Ottawa.
Ottawa, July 9.—Dr. Pelletier, reported in Belleville hospital, suffering from a severe wound, was at one time a picturesque character here and one of the celebrities of Ottawa. The local physicians disputed his right to practise, but he had a popular following, which furnished him more income than was received by many of his dignified confreres. He shocked the doctors by parading around the streets in a blue suit covered with brass buttons. He had an office on Bank street, where he displayed some mechanism by which he claimed to cure consumption by pumping oxygen into the lungs of his patients. About a year ago, his mother-in-law raised some questions about the legality of his marriage and Dr. Pelletier made a special trip from Ottawa to the City of Mexico in order to procure the proper certificate from the archbishop.

London, July 9.—The latest heroine of the suffragettes' cause is Miss Wallace Dunlop, who recently was sentenced to a month's imprisonment in the Holloway jail for posting notices on the walls of the House of Parliament. Miss Dunlop organized a hunger strike in the prison, and the authorities charged her this afternoon, after she had refused food for ninety-one hours. Miss Dunlop had only been in prison five days.

Calls For Cleanliness.

Ottawa, July 9.—Rules and regulations have been issued by R. R. Hollingsworth, to the city veterinarians, and will be posted in all dairies and cow pens. They are intended for farmers and dairymen and give concise hints for the care of premises, the cows, yards, the handling of milk and utensils. Cleanliness is the predominant note of the whole and, following the suggestions, will ensure a purer supply of milk.

Must Cease Illegals.

Walkerville, Ont., July 9.—A thorough investigation of hotel conditions in Sandwich East, by the Dominion Lord's Day Alliance, is promised as a campaign against the hotel by Father Braddon, parish priest of the Church of Our Lady of Lake. Father Braddon declares he will not give up the campaign until the number of licenses in the township is reduced and hotel-keepers cease to sell liquor on Sundays.

L. W. Bakewell Dead.

Clayton, N.Y., July 9.—A telegram announces the sudden death of L. W. Bakewell, who owned a cottage at Perry Point, on Grindstone Island, just opposite here. Mr. Bakewell was a Pittsburg patent lawyer and was arguing a case in the court room when death overtook him. Mrs. Bakewell and her son, Algeo, who were at the Bakewell cottage, left for Pittsburg.

Baseballers Fined.

Newburgh, Ont., July 9.—The members of the Newburgh baseball team, which played against Lansdale, Sunday, June 20th, appeared before Magistrate Bedford, Deseronto, and were fined \$5 each. The Lansdale players were fined some days ago.

LARGEST EVER MADE

WEIGHS 1,950 POUNDS AND MADE IN UTICA, N.Y.

Took Ten Tons of Milk to Produce and Was Paraffined in Open Air—Shipped to Chicago. Re-Measuring The Ramona.

Utica, N.Y., July 9.—A local cold storage warehouse company shipped to Chicago what is believed to be the largest cheese ever made. Its weight was 1,950 pounds. It took about ten tons of milk to produce it, and it was pressed into shape by a specially constructed press by a Lowville cheese factory, where it was bought by the Chicago firm through the cold storage company. The company as much as quite a number weighing as much as 1,200 pounds, but this was the largest one it ever tackled. It has a tank which is large enough to paraffin a half-ton cheese, but to-day the monster cheese was paraffined outside of the tank by carefully pouring the molten liquid over it. After the air-tight liquid had cooled, the cheese was encased in a sheet iron covering.
