**MONTREAL PRODUCE MARKET.**  
 Prices Paid For the Various Products.

Montreal, July 13.-The market for cheese last week closed with prices steady and unchanged from those current at the opening, almost every market in Ontario selling at 11c to 11 1/2c, the only exceptions being Ficton, which sold at 11 9/16c, the highest price of the week, and London, where 11c, was the highest price offered. This latter market was held on Saturday, and at that time there was an impression current that prices this week would rule lower in the county, and the buyers at this board were instructed to go quietly in the anticipation of lower prices.

The heavy receipts into Montreal last week have largely responsible for the easy tendency of the market towards the close of last week, and when the total figures for the week were published on Saturday the trade generally was staggered to find that they amounted to over 112,000 boxes which is an increase of over 30,000 boxes as compared with the corresponding week last year, and more than made up for the shortage in the figures published for the preceding week.
