WOULDN'T GIVE THEM FATHER EXHIBITS FINE SPIRIT OF TOLERANCE

Refuses to Divulge Names of Boys Whose Frank Caused His Son's Death—'They're Manly Little Fellows,' He Says.

New York, July 16.—J. C. Tracy, a contractor of Medford, L.L., last night refused to divulge the names of boys whose frank had resulted in the death of his son.

"I am sure the boys only acted in sport," he said, "and I would not for the world make public their names and cause their families any of the grief we suffer."

George Tracy was nine years of age, he died, yesterday afternoon, at the Freeport, L.L., hospital. Mystery surrounded the death from the fact that the father had rushed him forty miles over the country for an operation.

"My son was playing," said the father, "with good friends about his own age. They got a rope and tied him to a tree, in a spirit of fun. They are grieved over the affair as we are. There is already trouble enough without adding that of publicity to the families of the boys whose innocent act caused my child's death."

STEAMER WAS BEACHED
And a Disaster Was Narrowly Averted.

Montreal, July 16.—The Canadian St. Lawrence company's river steamer 'Fredericton,' from Montreal to Quebec, last night, with forty passengers and crew, had a narrow escape from disaster and the passengers only escaped through the beaching of the steamer after a hard run. She was struck by a severe storm while passing through St. Peter in the midst of which her shaft broke and fell to the bottom of the river. The water commenced to pour in and she was almost sinking when she reached a spot where she was beached.

DUCHESS MAY MARRY AGAIN.
Widow of Duke de Chaulnes Reported Engaged to Prince Murat.

Paris, July 16.—It is persistently rumored here that the Duchess de Chaulnes is to marry the young Prince Murat.

The duchess was Miss Theodora Shonts, daughter of the United States senator, before her marriage to the Duke de Chaulnes, whose tragic death in a Paris hotel a few months after the marriage furnished a nine days' sensation. A posthumous child preserves the de Chaulnes title.

Uniformed Soldiers Refused.
Seattle, Wash., July 15.—Mayor John F. Miller has written a letter to Commander H. A. Field, of the gunboat 'Yorktown,' expressing personal regret that men from the 'Yorktown' should have been excluded from a dance hall because of their uniform, but saying that there is no ordinance making such exclusion a violation of law. The proprietor of the hall says bluntly that he does not want uniformed soldiers on his floor. Commander Field took the side of the men and wrote a letter of complaint to the mayor.

WHITBY BIGAMY CASE.
Defendant Was Formerly Toronto Man.

Whitby, Ont., July 16.—Bigamy of a peculiarly aggravated nature was unearthed, yesterday, by a pretty young English girl, Gertrude Lomax, by name, who came from New York. She charges Henry D. Willing, an Englishman, prominently engaged in insurance and lately a manufacturer's agent for a large concern in Chatham, with marrying her, last May, in New York, while having a wife and family here in Whitby. Her story is a romantic one, and one of knowing Willing from childhood in Manchester, England, where his father is a leading cotton manufacturer.

THE LOSS OF LIFE
In Greece Will Far Exceed the Estimate.

Athens, Greece, July 16.—Belated reports coming in from Greece indicate that the loss of life from yesterday's earthquake will far exceed the estimate displayed in earlier reports, which declared only twenty had perished. The loss of life is now declared was enormous, and the figure when completed will be staggering. The government is rushing aid to the sufferers.

Suspect Murder.
Montreal, July 16.—The body of Cleophas Teppanier, found floating in the St. Lawrence, gives every evidence of murder having been committed. Teppanier left his room at Boucherville, on Friday, with \$63 in his pockets. He is known to have paid a bill of \$20.70, yet when picked up had only twenty-five cents left.

His pockets, further, were jammed with sand and pebbles, as though an endeavor had been made to sink the body. The police are engaged on the case.

Chatham, July 16.—Bathing in the river while still suffering from an attack of erysipelas proved fatal to Malcolm, the twelve-year-old son of McMay's Stonemason, who succumbed last night, to the poisoning which set in as a result.

TENDERS

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 25 years of age, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.
Duties—Six months' residence upon cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.
In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Entry \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.
A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
