TRAIL OF MURDERER

Is Being Closely Followed By Bloodhounds. July 17.—The knife with which Miss Emma Brooks was slain in her lonely home near Highland, Ontario, yesterday, was put to the noses of several bloodhounds, and the dogs started west along the Central New England railway tracks on the supposed trail of the murderer. The bloodhounds were taken off the trail yesterday afternoon, after following a trail through the woods and ending at the West Shore railroad siding a mile below Highland. It is believed the murderer of Miss Brooks

boarded a freight train here. Near the tracks a red lead pencil, which had been used by Miss Brooks on the afternoon of the murder, was picked up by the officers. The authorities think that the murderer is an Italian and is in New York city. AMERICA SLOW, SAY COUNTESS WHO MISSES HER CIGARETTES

"It's Absurd That Women are Not Allowed to Smoke in Hotel Dining Room"

Otherwise Visitor Finds She Likes This Country—The Countess and Countess Wolfgang, of Castell-Rudenhausen, Leave For Home To-Day.

"It is absurd that you don't allow women to enjoy a smoke in your hotels," said the Countess Wolfgang, of Castell-Rudenhausen, who is stopping at the Hotel St. Regis, New York. "Each a privilege is not denied women in Europe. Of course one may smoke in her own room, as the manager will happily tell you, but I mean in the dining rooms. What is the objection if a woman smokes her cigarette after meals at the table? In this respect the American women are not up to date. The countess and her husband, Count Wolfgang, of Castell-Rudenhausen, are just completing a tour around the world. They only stopped in New York for a few days, and are leaving to-day on the Kronprinz Wilhelm for Germany, whence they will go to their castle in Bavaria. "In Germany," explained the countess, "we try to please our American foreign travellers. I know that many American women smoke in public dining rooms when they are abroad, and it is surprising that they are not allowed to do the same at home. But, despite the fact that I had to give up my cigarettes after meals, I enjoyed my visit to America."

The Countess, Castell-Rudenhausen was very enthusiastic over her first visit to this country. She expressed particular interest in the American women and their deep concern in the affairs of the day, especially as pertaining to aeronautics and the suffrage movement. PRIEST AND WOMAN

WERE SHOT BY JEALOUS ASSASSIN.

The Former Sought Refuge Before the Altar—Both Victims Are in Hospital and May Die. Menton, July 17.—Jealous of the parish priest of the village of Gori, a young Gascon from Nice has shot both his wife and the priest. The victims are lying in a critical condition in a hospital at Menton. The husband, following his wife, a charming Parisian, to Gori, where their only child was being nursed, shot the Abbe Clave at the door of his presbytery. The wife, hearing the shots, left the nurse's cottage, close by, and received severe wounds in the body and wrist. The abbe took refuge in the church. His assailant pursued him, but refrained from further outrage on seeing the priest on his knees before the altar. The abbe had received two bullets in the chest. One that penetrated the lungs has not yet been extracted. Both the victims strenuously protest their innocence. The two men were formerly close friends. The priest dined with the couple when in Nice, and he entertained them at his presbytery when they visited their little son, to whom he had stood sponsor. The husband has produced an alleged incriminating letter, but both his wife and the abbe declare it to be a forgery.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations. ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The application must be made at the local Land Office or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.
