REMOVAL OF GARBAGE.
Clause in Specifications Re-Complaints.

The following clause in the specifications of the contract for garbage collection, regarding complaints, will be of interest:

"All complaints against the carrying out of this contract, on the part of occupants of the houses affected, shall be made to the office of the chief of police, who shall notify the sanitary inspector of such complaints, and it shall be the duty of the sanitary inspector to examine into all such complaints. The latter shall have power under this contract, to instruct the contractor in case cause for complaint is shown, to discharge any driver or other laborer guilty of neglect, discourtesy or improper work, or to cause the contractor to put on other carts, horses, labor or equipment, as may be required to properly carry out this contract. All authority delegated under this contract to the sanitary inspector shall refer to William H. McCammon, market clerk, who shall supervise all work under this contract. The said sanitary inspector shall delegate his authority under this contract to William McCammon, market clerk, to supervise all outside work."

Received At Dead Letter Office.
In the 13,000,000 pieces of mail matter received at the United States dead letter office last year there were 6,000 books, 1,000 pairs of spectacles, 500 fountain pens, 800 razors, a number of marriage certificates, ringed shoes—in fact, everything from valuable diamonds to penny souvenirs. There was more than \$5,000 in money, besides commercial paper, including checks, drafts, money orders, etc., representing a face value of \$2,303,991.

AT ST. LUKE'S CHURCH
MUCH-NEEDED ALTERATIONS TO BE MADE.

Plans For the Work Adopted at Vestry Meeting and It Will Be Proceeded With at Once—To Increase Seating Accommodation.

Monday evening a special vestry meeting was held in the church hall, at St. Luke's church, to consider the final proposals of the building committee, for enlarging the church building. Three months ago, the same committee submitted to the vestry designs for enlarging and improving the external appearance of the church, prepared by Messrs. Power & Son, and which exhibited rare taste and skill in converting an uncommonly plain edifice into a really picturesque and attractive parish church. But the plans proved to be too expensive for the means of the congregation, and so were reluctantly set aside by the vestry.

The present proposals of the committee were simply to add twenty-five feet to the west end of the church, thereby increasing its seating accommodation by one hundred, to amend to this an ample choir vestry, and to recast the entire nave and chancel, with pews of the best pattern. The outside appearance of the church would remain as it is for the present, but it is hoped that at some future time the congregation may be able to carry out Mr. Power's beautiful design, or even to employ his talents in planning a far larger and better church, for this growing part of the city.

The vestry, after discussing the proposals of the committee, expressed by resolution its approval and adoption of them, and the committee was re-appointed, with some additional members, and instructed to take all necessary steps for proceeding with the work. The names of the building committee were: George Compton and A. J. Shannon, churchwardens; R. Reynolds, Samuel Green, William Carroll, Alfred Murray, E. E. Horsley, John Caldwell, F. W. Clayton and the rector.

She carries four life boats and a naphtha launch, which is used as a tender, and also an auxiliary gasoline engine, used sometimes in place of the sails. A crew of twelve men has the big schooner in charge.

ELOPERS DEPORTED
LAW SUPPLEMENTED IN UNIQUE WAY.

Kingston Girl, Who Eloped With American Husband, Located in Canada—Pair Are Sent Back As Undesirables, As Offence Was Not Extraditable.

Plymouth, Mass., July 20.—A novel way of dealing with elopers was used in Canada in the case of Joseph Smythe, of this town, and Alice M. Aldrich, Kingston, who fled to Quebec a short time ago. Smythe is said to have deserted a wife and child here, both he and the girl being under bond on statutory charges. Warrants were issued for the fugitives, and American officers armed with extradition papers found them in Coaticook.

They were arrested and taken to Montreal. There the officers were informed that the offence was not of an extraditable kind. Chief Davidson, of Sherbrooke, suggested that the elopers be deported as undesirable citizens. Inquiry was made at the immigration bureau and the plan was approved. The necessary papers were made out, and Canadian officers took Smythe and Miss Aldrich by train toward the American line.

TO FARM RUBBER.
Vast Concession and Canadian President.
Guthrie, Okla., July 20.—With five million dollars capital stock, the Royal Rubber company was organized here. It owns a concession on eighty thousand acres of land south of the City of Mexico, and a charter has been applied for under the laws of Arizona.

F. H. Higdon, Canada, is president; Col. U. P. Ryan, Detroit, Mich., secretary. It was the intention to organize under Oklahoma laws, but the excessive charter fees changed the company's plans.

GIRLS WON'T SELL HAIR.

France Reports Human Hair Crop a Failure.

Paris, July 20.—Another crop besides wheat which has failed this year is that of human hair. July is the month when the human hair merchants come to France, from the United States and England to visit the towns and villages of the Limousin, of Brittany and Auvergne, where the annual hair markets are held. High prices are paid in New York and Chicago for postiches of French growth, which are best suited for the requirements of the present fashion of large hats and of the latest modes of coiffure, but the peasant girls of Limoges and Brittany have now abandoned the national bonnet which hitherto concealed their shorn heads, and this season they refuse to sell their hair, saying that they need it for their own use.

This strike of the peasant girls has given a disastrous setback to the French trade in human hair, and the dealers, unable to do any business in France, are leaving here for the Tyrol and other countries.

FIGHT OVER A RING.
Finds Her Gift to Husband on Another's Finger.

Muncie, Ind., July 20.—Mrs. Walter Lots, wife of the nominee for attorney general on the democratic state ticket last year, called at a hotel in Muncie, Saturday morning, and recognized a ring on Mrs. Ella Donovan's finger as one she had given to Mr. Lots several years ago, she attacked Mrs. Donovan. Both women were bruised about the face and neck and both lost a good deal of hair in the encounter.

Mrs. Lots was arrested on a charge of assault and battery with intent to kill. Mrs. Donovan does not explain how she came into possession of the ring.

ASKED FOR LAND.
So That City Could Have It Beautified.

Ottawa, July 20.—A civic deputation, to-day, asked Sir Wilfrid Laurier to turn over to the city, for park purposes, a tract of ordinance land near the canal on the east side of the city. It is not used for any purpose at present and can be greatly beautified. The premier asked that the matter be sent to him in writing for action by the cabinet.

Snowcaps Disappearing.
Mexico City, July 20.—Popocatepetl, the volcanic mountain, fifty miles to the south-east of this city, carries less snow at this time than at any time in the history of Mexico. The "head-dress" is gradually creeping up toward the crater.

Iztacchianti, the sister mountain, commonly known as the "sleeping woman," is at the same time losing her white covering, and far below the breast of Iztac the edge of the snow line is further up the side of the mountain than has ever been known before.

W.C.T.U. And The Cigarette.
Ottawa, July 20.—To raise the civic license fee to sell cigarettes from \$1 a year to at least \$25—if not \$50—is the proposition which the Women's Christian Temperance Union will shortly submit to the city authorities, and embraces a movement which it is considered will be most beneficial in checking the sale of tobacco in this form to minors. For some time past this matter has been carefully considered and already the movement seems to have found much support.

Bodies Recovered.
Ottawa, July 20.—The bodies of the two sisters, Jenny and Dorothy Green, employees of the Hotel Victoria, Aylmer, who were drowned in Lake Deschene, on Wednesday night last, while out boating with a couple of young men, were recovered near Britannia, to-day. The remains were badly decomposed. An inquest will be conducted by the Ottawa authorities, the bodies having been found on the Ottawa side.

Prince Ching Denounced.
London, July 20.—The Times publishes from its Peking correspondent a strong indictment of the incapacities and blunders of Prince Ching. The correspondent asserts that the ancient exclusiveness of the throne has been revived in the foreign office, owing to indignities which Prince Ching imposes on the representatives of the powers.

Chauffeur Sent To Penitentiary.
New York, July 20.—Edward Thompson, nineteen years of age, a joy-riding chauffeur, who pleaded guilty to taking out his employer's motor car without the owner's consent, was sentenced to one year in the penitentiary for knocking down Mrs. Sarah Deekwood and breaking her arm while out with the car.

Two Killed By Lightning.
Watertown, N.Y., July 20.—August Beauce, aged twenty-seven, and Frank Laesa, aged sixty, two Italian paper-makers, of Carthage, were found dead, on Monday, in the rear of a slaughter house at Carthage. The coroner has decided that the men were killed by lightning, on Sunday.

Sheriff Of Halton Dead.
Milton, Ont., July 20.—Matthew Clements, sheriff of the county of Halton, died at his residence, Monday afternoon. Heart failure was the cause of death. The late sheriff was in his eighty-third year, and was appointed by the Ontario government in 1882.

Locusts Coming Back.
Woodbury, N.Y., July 20.—This is the year that the seven-year locusts are due, and already, they are appearing in South Jersey. They appeared in this part of the state, in 1892, in great numbers.

Death In A Mine.
Langendorf, Prussia, July 20.—Fire damp exploded in a mine, at Musfeld, to-day. Three dead and many unconscious miners have been taken out. It is not known how many men still are in the mine.


