### NO HALF-WAY PLANS.

Free Lumber is the Thing That is Required.

Montreal, July 30.—Mrs. Whitewright, the English woman who has recently made herself very conspicuous and noisy in connection with the socialist propaganda in this city was recently arrested for assault and sent down to jail for a few days pending an investigation into her sanity.
