Free Lumber is the Thing That is Required.

Montreal, July 30.—Mrs. White, the English woman, who has recently made herself very conspicuous and noisy in connection with the socialistic propaganda in this city was recently arrested for assault and sent down to jail for a few days pending an investigation into her sanity. ### SUFFERED A LOSS.

Barnet's Sawmills in British Columbia Destroyed.  
Renfrew, Ont., July 31.—Alexander Barnet received a wire from British Columbia, stating that fire had swept his saw mills on Lulu Island, New Westminster. The industries of Mr. Barnet at the place named comprise a shingle mill, sawmill, box factory, dry kiln and other buildings. Should the fire have consumed the mills and machinery, Mr. Barnet estimates the loss at \$100,000. The shingle mill was started about a year ago and had a cutting capacity of 175,000 shingles a day. The sawmill and the box factory were started not more than a month. The machinery in both the mills and the factory was all new and up-to-date.

### Both Legs Severed.

Kenora, Ont., July 30.—William Morris, aged twenty-eight, an employee of the Keewatin Lumber Co., was struck by No. 2 train while on his way home to Kewatin. The deceased and other buildings, should the fire have consumed the mills and machinery, Mr. Barnet estimates the loss at \$100,000. Three Rivers, Que., July 30.—Philippe Bellefleur, proprietor of the Three Rivers Steam Laundry, was instantly killed last evening while working at the electric meter in his laundry.

H. Delorme, Ottawa, was arrested for enticing Nellie Dow, Renfrew, aged sixteen years, to Ottawa. A letter of extortion was submitted and suspended sentence imposed. Nellie had said to Delorme when he was closing up a moving picture show that there would be an excursion to Ottawa within a fortnight, and she would go down.

Jacob Steel, millionaire, and a prominent resident of Carnegie, Pa., has mysteriously disappeared. Detectives are searching for him.
