MONTEAL PRODUCE MARKET. The Prices Paid For Various Products.

Montreal, Aug. 3.—The demand for cheese during the past few days has been rather quiet, and orders from Great Britain have been few and far between. The small amount of trade passing may be due to the fact that the dealers on the other side have not yet returned to business, the first Monday in August being recognized as bank holiday in England. As a result very few cables have reached here from the other side, and those that have come in all speak of the holiday spirit prevailing there and the general lack of interest in cheese. The outlook, however, is for a steady market and we can count on full prices being paid for cheese in the country this week, provided the present dull spell does not indicate a complete falling in the general demand. There is no occasion to expect this, however, as stocks on both sides of the Atlantic are in small compass, and considerably less than at this time last year. The total visible stock on the first of the month was over 100,000 boxes less than last year. The small stock of cheese in existence, in view of the fact that the supplies from all sources are fully equal to that of last year, would indicate a larger consumption of cheese this year, and if this is actually the case, we can look for a steady market throughout the season, with very little fluctuation in the course of prices.

As was generally expected, the prices in the country last week advanced towards the close, and the markets on Thursday and Friday sold at slightly higher prices than those at the beginning of the week. The prices ruled from 11 1/2c. to 11 3/4c., a slight premium being paid for colored cheese in almost every case.

This week's markets will probably rule the same, although an advance may be looked for if we get an improved demand from the other side. The demand last week was comparatively small, as witness the shipments, which amounted to only 75,000 boxes, as compared with 110,000 boxes the week before. The receipts are keeping up well, and if the reports from the country are backed up by actual figures here we should have a decided increase in the total receipts of cheese into Montreal this month. Up to late we have been running almost neck and neck with last year's figures, but from now on we should show a fair increase.

The demand for butter has fallen off and the market is slowly but steadily declining. Last Saturday at Cowansville the offerings were all sold at 22c. per lb., and the highest price paid at St. Hyacinthe was 21 1/2c. Other country markets are going to-day at 21c. to 21 1/2c., with prospects of even lower prices looking towards the end of the week, unless there is some improvement in the demand either from Great Britain for export or from the local traders.

Finest Eastern Township creamery, today, is quoted at 22 1/2c., with ordinary finest at 22c. to 22 1/2c. per lb. Dairy butter is very scarce, and is selling up to 19c. per lb. for selected stock.

ROLLERS FOR LOCUSTS. Myriads of Insects Devastating Crops.

Vienna, Aug. 4.—Myriads of locusts have made their appearance in the district of Nagyrok, in Hungary, where they are devastating the crops.

One hundred eighty horses and steam rollers have been collected from far and near, and are being driven across the open country, crushing crops and insects together, as this has been found to be the only way to check the plague.

When she insects first made their appearance the farmers applied to a work with the industry of agriculture at Budapest, and, as they did not get that which they wanted at once, they sent a large case full of live locusts to the minister.
