**DIED AT THE DOOR**

**FATHER WAS ABOUT TO MEET DAUGHTER.**

Tragic Holiday Trip of Belleville Lawyer to Montreal—Daughter a Nurse in Hospital.

Montreal, Aug. 7.—To die within a few minutes of the time he was to meet his daughter, whom he was coming to visit, was the fate of George Denmark, of Belleville, Ont. He was taking a well-earned holiday from his law office, and when he arrived here he started to walk to the Royal Victoria hospital, where his daughter is a nurse, and they had planned to make a number of water trips from the city.

He collapsed in the street, and a student picked him up and took him to the hospital in a cab. But he died on the way, and the daughter, who was waiting to welcome him, identified the body as that of her father. The shock was so great that at first there were fears for her reason, but her work as a nurse had its effect in being to a certain extent prepared for these things, and she recovered. The body was sent home last night.

**WOMAN LOST LIFE WILL BE LOTS OF IT**

**GOT BEYOND HER DEPTH AND WENT DOWN.**

E. P. Wright Went to Her Rescue and Brought Up Her Body—She Was a Lady's Maid.

Gananoque, Aug. 7.—Another drowning fatality occurred, at Gananoque, about seven o'clock this morning, whereby a young woman, named McDonald, lost her life, under circumstances that were purely accidental. As customary, she went to the river to bathe, got beyond her depth, and called for help.

E. P. Wright, of Wright Dry Goods company, launched his motor boat, went to her rescue, dove after her, bringing her up at the second dive.

The young woman is said to be an orphan, coming to Canada from Scotland a few years ago, nineteen years of age, of pleasant appearance, and had acted for some time past as ladies' maid for Mrs. Clarkson Jones, Stone street.

The police were at once notified. The body had been in the water ten minutes. Mr. Wright tried every means to resuscitate her, but unsuccessfully.

Coroner Shaw, Lansdowne, notified, said an inquest was unnecessary. The remains were taken to McKenzie's embalming department.

**Phenomenal Growth Makes it Hard to Conceive Such Prospects—Farm Help Problem.**

Montreal, Aug. 7.—From all points in western provinces unanimity of opinion points to the anticipatory result of this year's harvest as being the greatest in the history of the west. In some places, such as Southern Alberta, the phenomenal growth makes it hard for the people to conceive such prospects.

The grain harvest will be general in about two weeks. To gather this anticipated harvest reports have been circulated to the effect that some 30,000 extra men will be required. From governmental sources of information the department of the interior learns that such a report is very much exaggerated. With the exception of two places reports from all the provinces state that the supply of farm help at the present time equals the demand, but that during the grain harvest more men will be required. From Saskatchewan and Alberta this is explained by the increased incoming of new settlers, who this year will have no crops to handle, and will consequently be available to help the older settlers.

At some points where these conditions exist it is even stated that the surplus help will have to look elsewhere to find employment, which shows that the usual number who go annually from the older provinces to the west to help in the harvest, will be sufficient. Wages remain firm at from \$15 to \$18 a month and board, the rate paid being regulated according to the experience of the men employed.

**Body Not Recovered.**

The search for the body of Mrs. Steer was continued Friday night, until a late hour, and again this morning, it was resumed, but up to noon no word had been received of it having been located.

Quite a number of people engaged boats and volunteered their services, and the district in which the fatality occurred was well patrolled, but with no result. It is feared that the body has drifted away, and may not be found for some days.

Mr. Steers assisted in the search for his wife's body and a report came over about noon, that he and a man named Stroud had run across something with grappling irons, and that what appeared to be human hair, was pulled up. However, they missed the body, if it was that they ran across, but the search is being continued.

Cornelius Clancy died at his residence in Newburgh, on Monday, after an illness extending over several years. A few years ago Mr. Clancy, with his family, moved from their farm at Wesley to the village. All loving hands and medical skill could do did not save him, and he passed peacefully away on Monday afternoon. Besides his widow he leaves five children: Albert, Miss Agnes, and Miss Gertrude, at home; Dr. Irvine Clancy, who is practising in the west, and Frank Clancy, Toronto.

Black currants brought from 10c. to 10 1/2c. per box, apples, 50c. to 60c. per bushel; new potatoes, 50c. to 60c. per bush.; eggs, 25c. per dozen, and butter 25c. to 27c.
