POLICE HUNT IN VAIN FOR SLAYER OF GIRL.

Man Who Murdered Anna Schumacher May be Hiding in or Near Rochester.

Rochester, N.Y., Aug. 11.—Neither the inquest into the murder of Anna Schumacher nor the search that has been continued by county and city police officers, aided by many persons whose services have been enlisted, has afforded anything like a substantial clue to the man who assaulted and brutally killed the seventeen-year-old girl last Saturday at Holy Sepulchre cemetery.

A man called at a farmhouse near the cemetery, Sunday morning, and asked for a pair of trousers, saying that his had been torn.

A pair was given to him, and this evening the discarded trousers were found near the cemetery by a constable. There is a report that these trousers are stained with blood. The
