Over 125 young fruit trees were chopped down by Black Hand men at Lockport, N.Y.

Victor Miville, an eleven-year-old boy, was drowned at the foot of Wolbridge avenue, Toronto.

R. G. H. Evans, accountant of the Bank of Montreal, Eglington, was drowned at Centre Island.

The United States naval construction programme may be altered to include two mighty warships of 30,000 ton displacement each.

James Wellington, New Wellington house, Port Dalhousie, was fined \$50 and costs for selling liquor to an Indian berry picker.

John Smith, colored, arrested on a charge of theft from jewelry stores, was sent to the Central prison for twenty-three months.

The rainfall at Winnipeg in the great storm of Friday, according to the government station, was the most in three-quarters. It all fell in two hours.

Charles B. Gordon, president of the Dominion Textile company, Montreal, has been elected a director of the Molson's bank. He succeeds the late W. C. McInnes.

Leroy Steward, superintendent of city delivery of mail in the Chicago post office, becomes chief of police to succeed George M. Shippy, resigned. He is aged 45 years.

Men are under arrest at Ilion, N.Y., Auburn, N.Y. and Cortland, N.Y., all accused of knowledge of the Rochester, N.Y. murder. Their movements are being queried into.

It is generally believed that the president of the new cement merger will be Sir Sandford Fleming, Ottawa, who the present may be Senator Edwards, of Rockland.

James Dumb, Montreal, who, a year ago, jumped overboard from an ocean steamer in the St. Lawrence, a supposed suicide, but who later turned up alive in London, is back in Montreal.

Nearly the entire Greek army has joined the mutineers on account of the efforts of the commanders of the fort to lower the Greek flag in compliance with the demand of the powers.

Cecil Guy Morrison, who had gained notoriety as a boy informer, was given a station in the Ottawa police court on Monday morning. Several times he has been arrested on charges of drunkenness, and was fined \$10 or six months.

At Orange, Tex., E. H. Rice, and his sister-in-law, Mrs. Al. Smith, fought in the street, with revolvers, a fight of domestic troubles. Rice is alive with three bullets in the body, and the woman is in jail.

Delina Vecco, No. 105 West Twenty-ninth street, New York, was shot and killed, on Monday, in trying to prevent the theft of all her money and half of domestic trappings, a balance of \$11,000, by a former lover.

A new trust company, to be known as the Canadian Mortgage Association, has been formed, and will commence business this fall. The new corporation will have a capital of \$3,500,000.

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CHOPPED THEM DOWN.

A BLACK HAND OUTRAGE AT LOCKPORT, N.Y.

Over 125 Young Trees Belonging to Italian Hotelkeeper Destroyed—Owner of Trees Had Been Threatened.

Lockport, N.Y., Aug. 16.—Over 125 three-year-old fruit trees in Joseph Horando's orchard were chopped down Sunday night, supposedly by a member of the so-called Black Hand. From the tracks in the orchard, it is believed that one man did the job.

Horando, who is a wealthy Italian hotel-keeper at Jitiching's Bridge, in the western part of the city, has had much trouble with Black Hand men. On August 7th last he received a letter demanding \$5,000. On April 5th last he received a similar letter, demanding \$3,000. He paid no attention to it, and a few nights later a bullet whistled into his room.

Last October, following a demand for several thousand dollars, a decoy package was placed in the appointed spot, and Vico Callabano, who came after the money, was shot by the police. He recovered and is now serving a prison sentence.

BURNED AND SCUTTLED.

Loss of New Brunswick Vessel at Yokohama.

St. John, N.B., Aug. 16.—A dispatch from Yokohama to Troop and Sons, ship owners, here, tells of the loss of the British barque Howard D. Troop at Yokohama. She caught fire and was scuttled. Capt. Durkie, of beloved the officers and crew are safe.

The barque was owned by Troop and Sons, and others here. She was a four-masted steel vessel, of 2,980 tons. She sailed from New York in March for Yokohama, and was to go thence to Portland, Oregon, and the United Kingdom.

An attempt was made to blow up, with dynamite, a bridge over the New York, New Haven and Hartford railway tracks at Garrison and Lezget avenues, New York, early on Monday morning.

ARRESTED FOR THEFT.

Young Man is Wanted By Toronto Police.

At the request of the Toronto police Constable James Craig, on Saturday, went out to Kingston Mills and placed under arrest Arthur Wallace, aged twenty-three, and married. He is wanted in Toronto and a collector for a firm here and it is alleged that he kept \$48 of the company's funds for his own use.

The accused is now at the police station awaiting the arrival of a detective from the Queen City.

The alleged theft took place some few weeks ago when Wallace disappeared from Toronto. It was believed that he came to Kingston and the local police were given a description of the man wanted.

Craig was given the case and succeeded in tracing the young man to Kingston Mills, where it was found that he had been working for about three weeks for Fallon Bros. in the erection of a bridge at Kingston Mills. While there the accused went under the name of Arthur Grimshaw. He was somewhat surprised when placed under arrest and declared that he had not stolen the money but that he had lost it after making his collection.

A detective arrived from Toronto, at noon, and left on the 3:19 G.T.R. train this afternoon, for that city with Wallace, and he will be arraigned in police court there on Tuesday morning.

Convict Shot.

Nowak, N.J., Aug. 16.—After a murderous attack on Matthew Smith and John Ryan, two keepers in the county jail here, Angelo Caprio, waiting to be tried on charge of murder, was shot and instantly killed by John Corby, another keeper, who had come to the rescue of his comrades.
