

WOULD OIL BE PROFITABLE ON ROADS,?

What the City Engineer Says-Mayor Couper Would Strike Off Smallpox Bills-City Buildings Renovations. City Engineer Craig, when asked

what he thought of oiling new macadam roadways, said he would first prefer to examine some of the roads in several places that have been given the oil treatment to see the value of so treating them. For instance, the coadway in Ogdensburg, N.Y., now eing constructed might be visited. first hand information, he said, was of ten times more value than pamphlet guarantees. Before he would advocate oiling macadam roadways here, he preferred to see the experimonts of places such as Ogdensburg. Tarvia is the best road oil, he said, and it would cost about \$500 or \$600 to oil a mile of macadam road of ordinary width. That would be about \$35 to oil a block. Cheaper oils could be used, but he didn't think they times a year would be expensive.


