FOR INTERNATIONAL NAVY ON THE HIGH SEAS.

Proposal Said to Have Been Made to Washington-Fleet of Powers in Mediterranean.

Washington, Aug. 21.-The American government will shortly be asked to join in a high sea programme by the leading powers of Europe, according to confidential information obtained

to-day. This programme has for its object the bringing together of ships from each nation to form an international fleet, whose purpose aims at the general protection of maritime interests. Their base is to be the Mediterranean. Great Britain, France, Germany, Italy, Austria, Russia and America will represented.

It is understood the fleet will consist of six battleships, fifteen cruisers, twelve torpedo boat destroyers (and thirty-six torpedo boats. It is possible that a similar fleet will be established in the Pacific


