

Javelle Water.

Wherever water is used in preparing bleaches it should be soft. The aikali in hard water affects all chemical substances. Javelle water is a standard preparation for bleaching white things and removing spots and stains, but must not touch colored surfaces. To make it dissolve half a pound of wash ing soda in a pint of boiling water an mix it with a quarter pound of chloride of lime dissolved in a quart of boiling water. Stir well, let settle, pour off the clear liquid and keep closely corked in a dark place.
