ALABAMA LIQUOR LAW.

Fuller Prohibition Bill Has Become Law.

Montgomery, Ala., Aug. 23.-The Fuller prohibition bill passed the senate 23 to 6. The measure forbids the possession of liquor except in houses, making the accused party prove his innocence before any evidence against him is introduced. The bill makes the use of the word saloon a crime, bars the advertisement of liquors from billboards and signs and holds that even the possession of a federal liquor ficense is an absolute proof of guilt in selling intoxicants. The bill is expected to become law to-day.


