**THE CITY TEAM SHOULD ORGANIZE PROMPTLY.**

There Will Be Good Available Material at Queen's Sufficient to Make Outsiders Step Some - R.M.C. Outfit Good.

What is the football outlook? Well it's a long guess, yet from where some of the old-timers sit, it looks pretty fair, and the local rooters, betters, and lovers of the pigskin will be given lots of excitement the coming season.

Last season Kingston had abundance of good football, and her teams went up near to the top, and this season they will do better.

As far as the city teams go, very little can be said. As in other years, it will likely be a couple of weeks before the first game, before anything is done to organize a team, with the result that the boys get the short end of the stick. However, the exception proves the rule, and here's hoping that this year the old Lions will go in to win, no matter what league they go into. There is certainly plenty of material for a first class fifteen, so the wise ones had better get together and stir things up.

In the intercollegiate series affairs look a little high. There will be plenty of games here, in the intermediate and junior series, and then some. For Queen's senior team, things do not look as glittering as they have in other years, but yet they are good enough to make the best of outsiders step. The intermediate and junior teams, representing the tricolor, should be a good as any in years past. A number of the senior bunch have left college, but some good fast men were on the second team last year, and there is sure to be some new stuff coming in.

Dennis Jordan, Queen's first manager, is the right man in the right place, and can handle the job to a nicety. He is at work already and will have everything in ship-shape. In all probability two trainers and a coach will be engaged, likely the same trainers as last season, but this has not been decided on yet. College will open before long, and practices will commence at once, then the men can find what is what, and what they want.

With the soldier boys across the bay, everything is blooming. A number of last year's senior team, including Rogers, Boswell, Green, Gwynne, Smith, Arnold, Goble, Young, Wheeler, Meredith and Peters, are back at college this year, giving them eleven men to start on, that played together before. This is a fine start and will be improved upon. The Royal Military College invariably gets some fine raw material, and this season is no exception, and once again Kingston is contributing her quota to the contingent.

Stuart Robertson is a football player of sterling qualities. He guarded centre half for the Collegiate team for two seasons, when it was the pride of the country, trimming anything that could be found. Colin Carruthers, also coming to the red and white with a reputation, captured at Upper Canada College; He is also a half-back, and has played the position for some years.

Besides these men there are the bunch that composed the second team last year, and this should give the cadets to fine teams, and bring a taste of the silverware back to grace the new gymnasium.

In junior circles we have J. J. Thompson's junior city league, and it is a fine thing. Any bunch of kids under fourteen years old can enter the league, including school teams, from all over the city. If this can be satisfactorily arranged, and there seems no reason why it cannot, it will prove an excellent thing for the boys themselves and also for the senior teams in a year or so. Lots of boys are playing senior ball when under twenty years old, and the only way they learned was by playing when very young. Mr. Thompson realizing this, has interested himself in the league, feeling that it is the only way that good players can be secured.

Another matter that caused a little inconvenience last season was the securing of grounds for one or two games; this should be attended to as soon as the different schedules are drawn up, and not left until too late. Now that Queen's campus is gone, only one ground remains. Queen's athletic field, and there are enough intercollegiate games to keep it busy.

**Baseball Contest.**

An interesting game of baseball was scheduled for this afternoon at Wolfe Island, between the junior Victorians and the senior Wolfe Islanders. The "kids" won over here, on Saturday last, and this game for \$50 a side is the outcome. Both teams have been doing good work during the season, especially the Vics, who have yet to lose their first game, and do not intend to lose it to Wolfe Island, after defeating all the junior city teams. The team left at one o'clock with a large following.

**Are Practising Nightly.**

The different senior city league teams are still faithfully practising especially the Victorians. Every evening at Victoria Park every man is out, and as long as it is day-light they play as hard as in a game. The reward of this good hard work is shown in the league standing, where the Vics are on top.

**Did Very Little.**

A meeting of the executive of the Kingston Amateur baseball league was called for Thursday evening at eight o'clock in the Hall hotel, but owing to the very slim attendance, very little business was done. The meeting was called to arrange a schedule for the postponed games, some five in number. As only a few members turned out, only one game was arranged for and that was the Victorians and Irishmen on Saturday afternoon.

The Irishmen still have a chance to win the league by winning all their games, and they will put up a great fight to do so.

**SHOULD BE NATIONAL**

**SHOULD NOT CRAMP**

**MEDICAL EDUCATION.**

What Drs. Ryan and Spankie Had to Tell a Reporter at Winnipeg on This Important Question.

At the Canadian Medical Association convention in Winnipeg, many of the important subjects to be discussed arise through this fact, namely, that no physician in Canada can practice outside of the province in which he graduated.

Discussing this matter, Dr. Edward Ryan, Kingston, Ont., a professor of Queen's University, and a delegate appointed by the Ontario Council to the present conference on this specific topic, stated to a Winnipeg Tribune reporter:

"Medical education should not be cramped by the boundaries of provinces of another examination. We are bound by such limitations. When a man has received a certificate, especially from one of the larger colleges, and has passed the council of his province that should be sufficient to entitle him to practice in any other province without going through the formality of another examination. We are aiming to do away with this provincial boundary line, and in so doing I believe we will incidentally create a spirit of national unity. It seems ridiculous that a profession like that of medicine, which has to do with the alleviation of human suffering, should be cramped by provincial boundaries. Similar expressions of opinion were made on this subject by Dr. W. Spankie of Kingston, inspector of public schools in Frontenac county, and also a delegate to the convention on this subject. "Our status should be national, not provincial," he said, and as an instance pointed out that if any person suddenly became ill at the time of speaking, though there were two hundred and forty physicians buzzing about the university, building in which he was speaking, nearly two hundred of these, being from other provinces, dare not give the afflicted one any medical aid without violating the law.
