There Are in Private Possession in Canada a Very Large Number of Works of the Old Masters of Greatest Value.

Canada is not lacking in wealth of valuable paintings. The superb collection at Laval, in itself really a public gallery for all practical purposes, is a little known example. And it is probably less known that there are, in private possession in Canada, a very large number of the works of the old masters of the greatest value.

The first perhaps in importance is a striking portrait of a specimen of the matchless work of Peter Paul Rubens whose masterpiece in Antwerp, the "Descent from the Cross," is familiar to all. The picture under notice is the property of Lieut-Col. W. H. Evans, commanding the 1st Regiment Prince of Wales' Fusiliers, Montreal.

This picture was sold some time ago at Christie's, in London, as the "Head of a Monk" and nothing more. But on the back of the panel is an inscription which shows that the picture is of historic as well as of artistic interest. It is a portrait of Henri, Duc de Joyeuse, sometime a Marshal of France, and a Capuchin Monk, alternately, and a member of a family renowned in the annals of France. He was born in the year 1567 and becoming a soldier distinguished himself as a warrior, but he was so stricken by the death of his wife, Catherine de la Valette, in 1587, that he assumed the robe and took the vows of the Franciscans and devoted himself to a life of holiness so much so that he appeared at the head of certain bands of religious devotees who were ravaging the Province of Languedoc and finally submitted to Henri IV., receiving the baton of a marshal, the government of Languedoc and an office in the royal household corresponding in some degree with that of the "Groom of the Stole" in the British Royal Household. But in the year 1600 a sudden impulse took him back to the monastic life, and undertaking a pilgrimage to Rome he died while on the road, of an unknown disease, or rudely cut on the reverse of the panel runs as follows: "Portrait du pere Ange de Joyeuse, Capucin, Maréchal de France, Mort a Rivoli en 1600 age de 41 ans." point par le guide d'Henry IV.

Of this remarkable character Valteire wrote in his most vitriolic manner: "Vieux, penitent, comtesse, solitaire, il prit, quitta, reprit la cuirasse et le habit." It may be noted that Lieut-Col. Evans also possesses a remarkable example of the work of Rembrandt which he purchased some time ago in Great Britain.

Professor as Professor.

The lamented death of Mr. J. F. Whiteaves, the assistant director of the Geological Survey of Canada in Ottawa on Sunday last, has elicited many an interesting anecdote of this really remarkable man. One of the best of them is told of a time when, years ago, he had charged the old museum on Sussex street. An Ottawa newspaper had been given the tip that there was a news item down at the museum, and one of the "cubs" was sent across the canal to "get the item." He came back with his story, and the copy was turned in. Later on in the day, Mr. Whiteaves, who was conscientious in even small things, called in at the newspaper office on his way to lunch and asked if he could see the proof of the item. The reporter, who had not known much about natural history, had written down that among the new acquisitions of the museum was a red-crested deer. "Now there is no such thing as a red-crested deer; but there is a red-crested moose; and so Mr. Whiteaves changed the matter in the paper. But what was his horror, when taking up the newspaper later on in the day, to find that among the recent additions to the museum was a "red-crested moose." He then and there gave up all idea of becoming a proof-reader. His handwriting was not so good, and a further part of the joke is that the "cub reporter" of those days is now not only an M.P., but very high in the councils of his party.

Train Despatch by Telephone.

The use of the telephone instead of the telegraph for despatching trains, one of the main subjects at the Detroit Convention of railway telegraph superintendents of the United States, is being tried on the Swift-Current to the Medicine Hat division of the Canadian Pacific Railway, a stretch of some 150 miles. This, although an innovation in the Middle West, has been found so satisfactory in its results that its universal adoption is only a matter of time. Canadian Pacific trains will in future carry telephone sets, and in case of a breakdown communication can at once be made with the nearest railway station. The regular telegraphing staff will not be reduced, as the operators are wanted for general railway work.

A Race For a Copyright.

A good deal of interest was manifested in Montreal recently by the fact that Henry Savage, who recently bought the copyright of the play called "The Love Cure," put the piece on the boards there and played it, as it was learned that others had design on the copyright.

It was stipulated that it must be played once in the Empire, so Savage sent a representative there, got a scratch company together and won a victory over all competitors.

Of course none of the actors had ever been together and few knew their lines, but the play was gone through with all the same.

Captured Young Bull Moose.

A young bull moose was caught in the wire fence of the C.P.R. about twenty miles north of Parry Sound a few days ago. The crew of a passing train captured the animal and brought it to town where it is being nursed and tamed. It is believed to be about three months' old.

THE BALLOON FISH.

It is Quite a Creature on the Nile.

A Berlin journal, Prometheus, contains a letter from Africa, in which the writer describes a fish which is known to the natives as the fakaka. It makes its appearance in the Nile at high water time. The creature might properly be named a balloon fish. Its whole body, with the exception of its head, is covered with a thick layer of a jelly like substance. On the uncovered part there are many sharp prongs. When attacked the fish rises to the surface, inhales air until its body assumes almost a globular form, then turns up its back, and by means of its protective prongs upward in the water. "Fish and man alike know how sharp these are and what painful wounds they can inflict, and they give the balloon fish a wide berth."

A Royal Fowl.

In England under an old law still in force the swan is a royal fowl, as whales and sturgeons are royal fish. All swans the property whereof is not otherwise definable when within the British dominions belong to the crown by virtue of this prerogative. When swans are lawfully taken into the possession of a private person such person may be said to have a property in them, but if they be at liberty they belong to the crown. Formerly it was necessary for persons who wished to keep these "royal fowls" to obtain a swan mark, which was granted by the crown and which could not be legally impressed without grant or prescription.

Whipping M.P.'s.

The urgency of a summons to Westminster issued by the Government Whip is indicated by the number of lines which underscore the opening word, important. A one-line Government whip means, "You ought to come"; a two-line whip, "You should come"; a three-line whip, "You must come"; and a four-line whip, "You are or there will be a smash-up of the Government, and a General Election."

Briefly put, the duty of the Chief Whip of the Government is to see that this party has always sufficient members in the House of Commons to carry out the duty of the Opposition Whip to try to snatch a victory. The Chief Whip of the Government fills an office in the Administration styled "Patronage Secretary to the Treasury," in which there are no duties to be discharged, but to which the substantial salary of \$10,000 per annum is attached. Opposition Whips receive no financial recompense from the state.

No Fear of Annexation.

Earl Grey, speaking in London at the Dominion Day banquet, said: "There are some who fear that the large American immigration may stimulate a desire by some people in Canada to be incorporated with the United States. We are told by the newspapers that 80,000 Americans, with 80,000,000 dollars of capital, have come to our shores in the last year. We are glad to receive them all. Next year there will probably be a still greater number, and if this year's harvest proves as fertile as those that have preceded it, we will be able to welcome many more."

A Lady Churchwarden.

Miss Lenthal has consented to serve as rector's churchwarden at Besselsleigh, Berks, England, in succession to her brother, who succeeded his father in the office. The owner of the Besselsleigh estate has been one of the churchwardens of the parish for 150 years. The Lenthals are direct descendants of Wm. Lenthal, Speaker of the Long Parliament, and it was he who purchased Besselsleigh Manor from the Fettiplaces.
