By the Wylie Assassination in London—Lord Mayo Has Gone to Andaman Islands. The sensational murder of Sir William Curzon Wylie, the political A.D.C. to the Secretary for India, at the Imperial Institute, recalls the tragic death, thirty-seven years ago, of Lord Mayo, father of the present holder of the title, who, while acting as Governor-General of India, was killed by a convict named Shere Ali.

Lord Mayo had gone to the Andaman Islands to examine for himself the convict station there, which was said to be in a condition of disorder. The inspection over, Lord Mayo had reached the pier on his way to re-embark on the man-of-war Glasgow, when Ali, who was allowed to be at liberty owing to his good conduct, broke through the guard, under cover of the darkness, and stabbed the viceroy twice in the back.
