**LOYAL OLD DENISON
DECIDED IT WAS NO OFFENCE**

To Pull Down a Yankee Flag in
Toronto—Two Members of the
48th Highlanders Exonerated

Toronto, Sept. 7.—In the police court this morning, Magistrate Denison dismissed the charge of theft and disorderly conduct made against Henry Carson and James Mahoney, members of the 48th Highlanders, by a United States resident who has a house on Simcoe street. The men were returning from the exhibition last night when they noticed a United States flag flying in front of the Simcoe street residence. They pulled the flag down and tore it to pieces. The charges followed.

After hearing the evidence the magistrate asked: "What do we want with that flag here anyway?" To which T. C. Robbinette, counsel for the prisoners, answered, "There are too many of them in this country your worship. On the part of the accused, this was only an exuberant outburst of patriotism."

"The case is dismissed," said Denison, and the men left the court.

PITH OF THE NEWS.

The Very Latest Culled From All Over The World.

E. H. Hayman has suffered a sharp reape.

Lord Charles Beresford is at Cobalt and was warmly received.

The Canadian Embalmers' Association is in session in Toronto.

The Laurentide Paper company stock increased to \$2,800,000.

Nineteen Windsor Chinamen are summoned to police court for gambling.

The high court of Quebec, Independent Order of Foresters, is meeting in Montreal.

Earl Grey opened the Granville street bridge at Vancouver, B.C., on Monday.

The steamer Arthur H. Hawkins, stuck in the Granville Street Canal, has been raised.

Miss Anna Hughes, evangelist, died on the Auditorium platform at Ocean Grove, N.J., on Sunday night.

Frank P. Arnold was probably fatally shot, after being held up by three men near Washington Park, in Chicago.

In the burning of the Erwin hotel, Ogdenburg, near midnight, the guests had a hurried exit in their night envelopes.

Joseph Schiro, a young ironworker, while drunk, shot three women on the streets of New Orleans. One was seriously wounded.

Ale Lepersane, Montreal, shown by the royal commission investigation to have demanded \$1,000 to get a contract for J. R. and A. Jacobs.

Hon. George P. Graham, minister of railways and canals, in Montreal, conferring with engineers regarding the reconstruction of the Quebec bridge.

Mrs. McLeary, wife of John McLeary, president of the McCleary Manufacturing company, London, died Tuesday morning, aged seventy years.

Hon. Charles Murphy addressed the Labor unions at London, Ont., on Monday. He said the Laurier government was anxious to recognize the claims of labor.

The woman who was drowned under suspicious circumstances on Saturday night, at Ottawa, has been identified as Miss Alice Rivet, of Clarence street. The two suspects are still under arrest.

John Kelly, a Toronto lad of thirteen years, is lying at the point of death in the Hospital for Sick Children as the result of drunken daredevilishness on the part of one of his companions. He was shot with a twenty-two-calibre rifle, near the Lansdowne Avenue railway bridge, Monday afternoon, by a youth named Waterson.

GREAT STOCK SLUMP

Over a Rumor That Harriman Was Dead.

New York, Sept. 7.—The New York Stock Exchange opened in a frenzy of excitement, this morning, and stocks slumped at the opening, in some cases falling with a crash 5½ points. The Harriman issue led the decline, Union Pacific selling at \$84.

London heard that Harriman was dead, and there was a violent slump in all American securities in the English exchange before the rumor could be denied.

Stung again, was the cry raised by management of the Watertown baseball club when "Con" Millan and his Kingston Ponies failed to appear for their scheduled game with Watertown. It appears that "Con" with his bunch of baseball followers missed the regular bullet bound for the Cape, but later got to the American port in some unknown way. After setting foot on good old Yankee turf they found that the train had long since left for Watertown. There was a big crowd at Grafton City park to see the game and all were deeply disappointed at the outcome. Watertown has lost considerable money through this unfortunate project and it is stated by the local management that the Kingston ball clubs which have been the only offenders in this line, will never have the chance to "sting" them again.

Taught Them A Lesson.

Port Hope, Sept. 7.—For failing to stop their automobile, while passing a funeral here, three weeks ago, F. A. Ray, the owner, of Pittsburgh, Pa., and A. Hamilton, the chauffeur, were this morning fined \$5 and \$1.25 costs each in the police court. The law requires that autos must stop and turn down a side street for funerals. The auto in question passed the funeral very slowly. The law is only for the county.

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CENTRAL CANADA FAIR.

Big Annual Exhibition in Ottawa

Sept. 10th to 18th.

This year's Central Canada Fair in Ottawa, all of next week, will be on a larger scale than has ever been attempted before. The exhibition will open to the public on the 13th. The new grand stand, with accommodation for over twelve thousand people, is being rushed, and exhibitors are now engaged in placing their exhibits in the buildings. Space in the main or manufacturers' pavilion as well as in the annex will be fully occupied, there will be a process of manufacture while all of the varied departments, many of them new, will be fully up to the mark.

The showing of live stock, sheep, swine and poultry, will be the most extensive ever shown, judging by the entries that are pouring in.

Horse races, trotting, pacing and running will take place daily. A daily parade of live stock and public judging will be other interesting features. Then there will be a dozen vaudeville members introducing acts entertaining, afternoon and evening, by select military bands, a daily flight of the Nassar airship, and dozens of other attractions including the always amusing midway. At night the great spectacular Siege of Sebastopol will be put on accompanied by a military tattoo and fireworks of astounding brilliancy. All the railways are quoting cheap rates and it is expected that there will be a large patronage from this district.
