Tips For The Farmers

The Toronto Weekly "Sun," summing up the crop situation, says: "This has been a most unusual year in Ontario. Starting with a fair prospect in early spring, the wet, cold weather which came later, delayed seeding to July—a month beyond the usual date. After this there was a period of drought which greatly checked the young crop. At one time it looked like an almost complete failure, but the usual drought, just before harvest, was broken by frequent showers, and as a consequence grain has come on in a way that has surprised everybody. All danger of famine has been averted, save in a few localities where grasshoppers caused havoc, but an average crop in Ontario cannot be looked for. Still it is so much better than feared at one time that little complaint is heard.

In the west it looks as if the outlook is also going to be better than could have been hoped for at one time. A late spring there as here has been followed by very rapid growth, so that, aside from damage by hail, which is considerable, a fairly good harvest will be reaped. It will not be a bumper year, it will not even be an average one, but the returns will apparently be sufficient to prevent a serious setback to the general revival of industry that is reported from all over America.

Corn looks well throughout Ontario this year. It is a little late in some sections, but is strong and vigorous, and, if frost holds off fairly well, the glazing stage will be reached all right before going in the silo.

Not so long ago a cheese weighing 1,950 pounds was shipped from Utica, N.Y., to Chicago. It is said that it took ten tons of milk to provide the materials in this great cheese. It was pressed into shape by specially constructed machinery, and was coated with paraffin, to make it airtight; in the open.

In Denmark there are nearly 11,000 farmers owning 190,000 cows which they milk regularly tested for butter-fat, and the testing associations have improved the yield by 1,000 lbs. per cow or forty pounds of butter per cow in a few years.

In a herd belonging to a member of a cow-testing association, one cow gave fourteen pounds one morning and only eight pounds the next morning, but fifteen pounds of milk the next morning. Many other cows show just as sharp variations.

Young pigs should be looked after carefully at this season. Sometimes they are afflicted with cough. Keep the pens dry with plenty of fresh air and sunlight.

Do not neglect farm machinery, even if it is the busy harvest season. It costs money. Every farm should have a convenient farm implement shed, and when a machine is not in use it should be under cover.

Fog some time past Prof. Zavitz, of the O.A.C., has been endeavoring to secure a cross between Dawson's Golden Chaff and one of the hard milling wheats, the object being to combine the yielding qualities of the one with milling qualities of the other.

Something of the same kind is also being attempted in Great Britain, where Prof. Biffen, of the department of agriculture at Cambridge, is endeavoring to secure a cross between the high yielding wheats of England, and the hard milling wheats of the Canadian west. The results already attained are, according to the Canadian trade agent at Leeds, sufficient to justify sanguine expectations as to the outcome.

A field of corn now growing on the farm of Henry Glendinning, near Matilda, is a standing tribute to another merit in alfalfa. The field on which this corn is growing had been in alfalfa for some five years. Winter before last the plant killed out so badly, and June grass had got in to such an extent that it was decided the following spring to plow up and plant corn. A top dressing of manure was applied, the field was plowed and an excellent crop is the result.

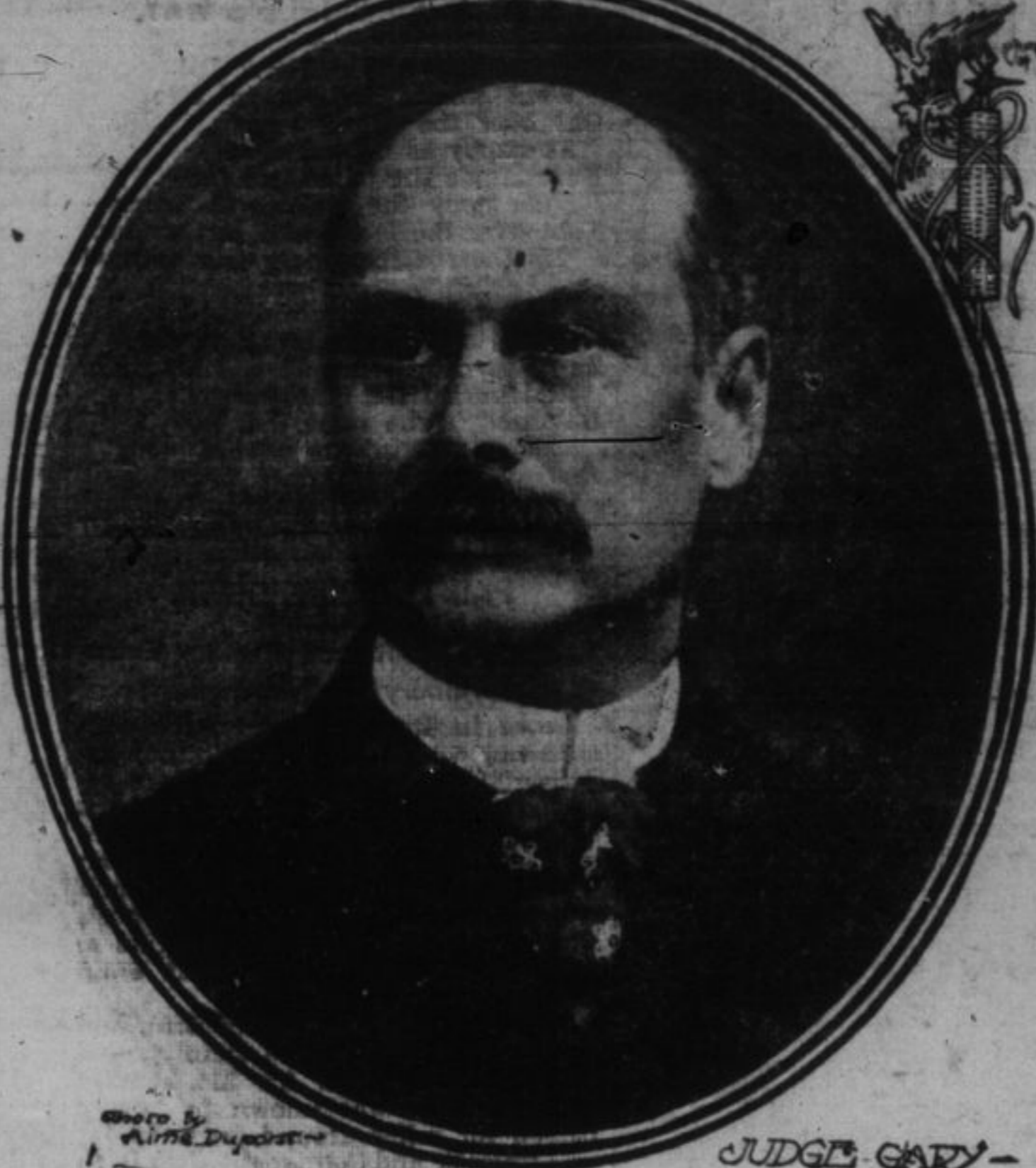
A Winnipeg despatch says: Some districts are offering \$2.50 per day, or \$45 per month, for inexperienced men to help with the harvest.

The yield of meadows in England has this year fallen off below the average. There was an abundance of moisture but a lack of sun. As a consequence the English demand for hay from abroad will be unusually heavy.

Down in the southern part of Ontario county there are many farms of which the soil is almost taken possession. The pest first became serious about fifteen years ago and has been steadily increasing ever since. A little of the weed got around Niagara about the same time, but in all that period, Mr. Glendinning says, there has been no increase. He attributes this to the practice of short rotation in farming. On his own farm the usual rotation is a three year one, and in no case goes beyond four.

Care In Feeding Fowls.

Fowls must not be overfed. They should have only what they will eat up clean, says Western Poultry Journal. The dry feeding method, however, allows food to be constantly before the stock in hoppers. Champions of this method claim that fowls will not overfeed when dry material is constantly before them, for they eat it only by degrees, taking with it drafts of water to wash down the food. This, we believe, should be allowed only with dry mash and not with whole or cracked grain. In the latter case the amount should be limited to an average of a handful for each fowl in the pen and scattered among other so as to induce exerting.

Cowan, of McGill, who was counted upon to succeed Ryan at outside wing for Ottawa, has gone to Montreal, and may play with M.A.C.A. Pawl, former half back of the Ottawa College team, is not likely to play with the Ottawas owing to rheumatism.

Blistered Chicks.

Western Poultry Journal: Blistered chicks often show themselves in young chicks. The skin puffs out and seems like a bladder of wind. It comes on the abdomen, sides and under the wings and neck. Prick the blisters with a needle to let out the air. Add carbonate of iron, alternated with granulated charcoal, daily in the food.

The diet should be oatmeal principally, with plenty of sharp grit within reach.

Worms In Horses.

Breeder's Gazette: Green grass grazing at this time of the year is all that is needed temporarily to rid horses of worms. If they cannot be grazed mix a tablespoonful of a mixture of equal parts of dried sulphate of iron, salt, flowers of sulphur and ground gentian root in the feed night and morning for ten days, then skip ten days and repeat. Omit the iron if for pregnant mares.

Summer Care of Chicks.

Cor. American Agriculturist: Cleanliness in housing, regularity in feeding and freedom of range are very important in rearing chicks. A variety of wholesome feed should be supplied regularly if possible, the flock should be kept on virgin soil, where there is plenty of vegetation and shade. This will supply natural conditions for the birds, which will thus be maintained in healthy condition.

Remedy For Bloody Milk.

Country Gentleman: Give the cow one pound epsom salts, one ounce powdered gentian, mix with a quart of hot water and give when cold. Put in feed twice a day a dose of this powder: Bicarbonate of soda, eight ounces; bicarbonate of potassium, six ounces; powdered charcoal, four ounces; mix. Dose, two tablespoonfuls.

CARTOONIST CLAIMS LIBEL

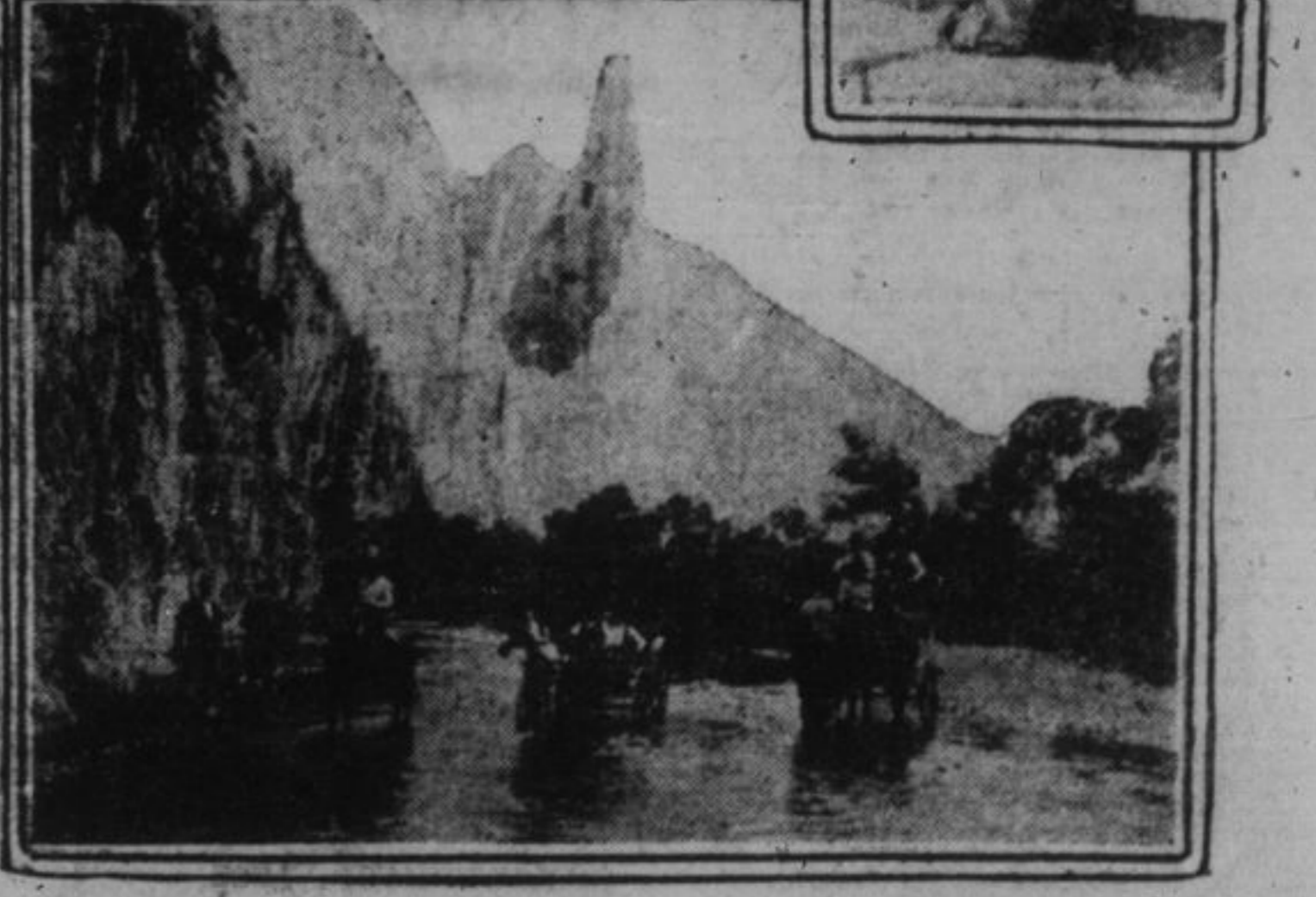
Sues New York Publisher For \$100,000 Damages.

New York, Sept. 10.—Thomas F. Powers, the cartoonist of the Evening Journal, has brought suit for \$100,000 damages against Henry Riddle, publisher, treasurer, and manager of The Catholic News, in which periodical a statement was published on August 7th last, purporting to show that one of Mr. Powers' cartoons was "an insult to the faith of Catholics."

Mr. Powers declares in his complaint, filed in the supreme court, that the allegation is false, wicked and defamatory, and that the cartoon which the defendant chose to construe as representing Pope Pius X, was in reality, and quite obviously, a representation of the Shah of Persia.
