**"HE RUINED MY LIFE AND I MEANT TO RUIN HIS," GIRL SAID**  
**STARVED AND DESERTED.**  
**Found Owner For Team Left on Street.**  
 The police have found an owner for the team of horses, and a rig, deserted on Johnson street, near Regent, yesterday morning. The team belongs to a woman living near Verona, and she says that she loaned the team to a young man to take a drive eight miles out of Verona. He stated that he had some important business to transact, and as she knew him, kindly consented to let him have the outfit.  
 Instead of making the short trip, as he had stated, the young man came on to Kingston, deserted the horses and rig, and his present whereabouts are unknown.  
 Yesterday morning a telephone call was received by the police, which stated that no owner could be found for the outfit. Constable Naylon went to the scene, and found the rig on the side of the road. The animals had run the rig up against a telegraph pole. As the owner could not be found, the constable had the horses cared for at a livery stable, and the poor animals gave evidence of having been almost starved.  
 Inquiries were made by the police, and it was found that the horse and rig belonged to a Verona woman, and she was sent for. She reached the city this morning, and left for home, with the team this afternoon.

**ROAD PAVING CANVASS**  
**Will Be Difficult to Get Two-Thirds to Sign.**  
 The canvass of the business blocks regarding road paving will likely come before a special meeting of the Board of Works. The civic finance committee has been instructed to provide \$100 for the purpose. It is understood that it will be difficult to get two-thirds of the property owners on Princess street to sign for pavement, for the reason that much of the property on that thoroughfare is owned by corporations and absentees. These classes of owners are not very willing to have expense added to their properties. However, the canvass will be made, and in a month the result should be made known to the city council. Before the council can order street paving on the local improvement plan without consulting the property owners, a three-fourth vote in favor is required. Last year the vote was 15 to 6, whereas seventeen votes were required to carry the project.

**MEANS OF SMUGGLING**  
**CHINAMEN FROM KINGSTON DISCOVERED.**  
 Detectives Found Out the Methods Employed—Gasoline Yacht Used—Horsehoe Island Watched.  
 United States detectives, who were here in regard to smuggling of Chinese from Kingston into New York State, discovered a few things. They found that there have been agencies of Chinese smuggling here, but to definitely locate those involved is another thing, although the detectives have secured some information as to the daring smugglers.  
 It came to the ears of the United States immigration authorities that the smuggling of Chinamen was effected by a small gasoline yacht, with fishing and camping outfit, running from Kingston to Horse Shoe Island or thereabouts at night. They also carried an acetylene searchlight, and responded to signals from the United States shore, between Cape Vincent and Sackett's Harbor. It is also understood that Chinamen were landed from Kingston below Cape Vincent at night, and travelled in a carriage inland, and took train for Watertown, N.Y. A short time ago Chinamen who had been smuggled from Kingston were caught in Watertown. The shoe and the cars are being watched, and informants will report anything suspicious they see up there.  
 There's good money in smuggling Chinamen, the usual charge being \$250, paid in advance. Informants can also make money, the United States government paying handsomely for tips leading to the capture of smuggled Celestials.  
 Kingston is the choice of places for smuggling. It is the shortest distance of any Canadian port from New York city, being only about 415 miles. This distance is not patrolled as it is further down the line, and landings are more easily effected.  
 The detectives enquired into a story that four Chinamen were smuggled here last week, but were unable to find out whether there was anything in it or not. They were impressed by the fact that there are an unusually large number of Chinese in Kingston at present. Yesterday, four Chinamen were along the harbor front and it was thought they were waiting to be taken over as their actions were suspicious.  
 A woman detective from New York, has been here in regard to Japanese smuggling. It has been found that several Japs got across from Kingston not long ago, and the source of their transport was sought.  
 The United States customs officials are making a determined effort to lessen the smuggling of goods from Kingston. Both countries wish to stop smuggling, but have a difficult task. During the past summer, Kingston was closely watched by United States officials, and several wealthy people who resided among the Thousand Islands were held up, but paid the duty demanded. One woman had to pay \$225 duty on goods bought in Kingston, and secreted on her person. But that won't stop them buying in Kingston.

**YEAR IN THE CENTRAL**  
**FRANK STARK SENTENCED FOR ROBBING MATE.**  
 Records at Toronto Showed Fourteen Convictions Against the Prisoner—These Had All Been Registered Since the Year 1892.  
 Frank Stark, who was found guilty of robbing his room mate, a well-known citizen, at a local hotel, one night last week, and remanded for sentence, was this morning, sentenced by Magistrate Farrell, to one year in the Central Prison.  
 It will be remembered, that the citizen arose early in the morning, when he missed his wad of \$80, gold watch and chain, and clothing. He notified the police, and Constables Bateson and Naylon succeeded in getting Stark on board the steamer America, just before the vessel was about to leave for Cape Vincent. Stark was wearing his room mate's clothing, and had the watch and chain and all the missing money, with the exception of 50 cents which he told the court, afterwards, he had spent.  
 The magistrate remanded him, in order to secure some information as to his career, and the information that he secured, proved to be very bad news for the prisoner.  
 A record the court had received from Toronto, showed, that since 1892, there had been ten convictions registered against him, the majority of them for theft, one for assault and robbery, and another for attempted assault and robbery.  
 "I will sentence you to one year in the Central prison," said the magistrate, without any comment, and Stark was led away by a constable.
