### SCANDALS OF THE COUNCIL.

The evidence has been abundant that in some aspects the council of 1909 has been a weak one, and now the evidence is afforded that it is seriously lacking in manners. The representatives of the people are expected to deal with public questions in an amicable and able way, and they can certainly exchange their opinions on current events without a resort to personalities.

Business men can meet ordinarily and conduct their relations amicably. It is only occasionally that one hears of a breach of decorum, and the incident is private. The business operator, however, proceeds deliberately. He studies the situation. He is prepared for contingencies, and he meets them usually with some degree of tact or grace. Not so the member of the council. He seems to go to the meetings without the necessary preparation. He gets busy when it is too late, and if he does not comprehend all that is passing he becomes blatant, sometimes abusive.

The scenes of this year reflect injuriously upon the city. They are reported in the papers. They are copied into the press of other places. They are commented upon and the council—all its members, the innocent as well as the offenders—are reproached and ridiculed. They say, as one did to the Whig, yesterday, that as the council is so in the city, that little can be looked for in legislation that is of a helpful character when the aldermen quarrel among themselves, and some of them show a contempt for the chair.

What is the meaning of all this? What is the cure? The electors must give this matter their serious consideration, for they surely cannot be willing that the scandals of the council shall continue.

### LABOUR'S NEEDS AND PERILS.

The labour question has again arisen in connection with the Grand Trunk Pacific railway. Some time ago it was alleged by the constructing company that necessary progress would be retarded because of the scarcity of labour, and it was proposed to import the foreigners whose services were so much required.

The rough toil of railway building has been delegated usually to the Poles and Italians, to any toughened material that is available for the purpose. Railroad building is very slavish work. It is work which the whites do not envy and will not willingly perform, and we can quite believe that it will be a long time before the Grand Trunk Pacific is complete across the mountains when of the twenty thousand men who are wanted less than twenty hundred can be secured, and the wage is 83 per day and board.

The proposition is that the ban be lifted from the importation of the Asiatics and to that strong opposition will be offered. Twenty thousand yellow men—yellow in heart and in life and in manner of living—will constitute an element in population which will not be for its good. The Chinese and the Japanese that will isolate themselves in the mountains for a number of years and endure the hardships of pioneer service will not eventually become very useful in other walks of life, and of the dregs of any nation, the undesirable, Canada has had enough already.

If an army of men, mere human machines, could be had to perform a certain contract, and then go out of the country there would be less objection. Their presence could be tolerated, but to let them loose upon the community, without the prospect of fitting into its service afterwards anywhere, is to do that which will imperil the public peace and project into society a menace of no common sort.
