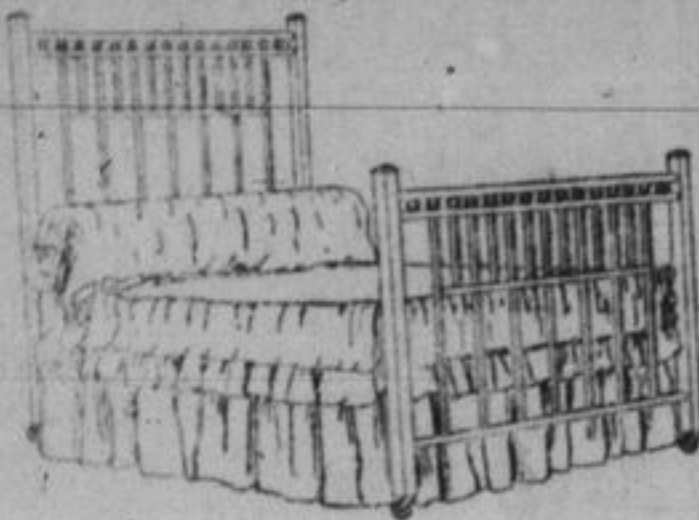

**THERE IS STILL HOPE**  
**That the Laundry Tax Will Be Reduced.**

There is still hope that the laundry tax will be reduced. The vote last Monday evening was twelve to nine, against an immediate second reading of the by-law to repeal the high tax measure. If Ald. Hailey had been present, the vote would have been twelve to ten. One alderman voted against the second reading last Monday, says he may possibly vote for a lower tax, but wasn't satisfied with rushing things. If one other alderman votes for reduction, the new measure introduced by Ald. Kent will be carried.

The vote of the city council does not represent "the feeling of the people," who are strongly opposed to placing a burden upon the Chinese laundrymen. People say that the Chinese laundrymen are a necessity in Kingston. They will need that the big laundries cannot fill. To wipe out the Chinese laundries here, they declare, would be like wiping out the small corner grocery stores that have proven themselves so convenient to the people. It will go to Brockville, Gannanque or Napanee, or some nearby place. The fact that the yellow men are getting such a large patronage shows where the sympathy of the people lies. If they didn't want the Chinamen here, they wouldn't patronize their laundries. Let the high tax aldermen remember that.
