COMING!

Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta.

The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district, either by proxy, may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duration—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead and farm at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader, in good standing, may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price, \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in the district, and cultivate the time required to earn homestead patent, and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

EAGER FOR A FIGHT

THIS IS THE FEELING OF BRITISH LIBERALS.

The Remarks of Premier Asquith at a Great Budget Demonstration in Birmingham, England—The Busy Suffragettes

Birmingham, Sept. 18.—Premier Asquith, last night, addressed a great budget demonstration here. He declared the House of Lords was "incompetent in function" and that the Liberals were eager for a fight should the House of Lords venture to reject the budget.

The meeting was remarkable because of the frenzied behaviour of the suffragettes, who threw toy bombs and wadded axes during the proceedings. Two of the women climbed to the roof of a building adjacent to Bingley hall, where the meeting was held, and loosed tiles and bricks with axes and pelted the police below. Several persons were hurt.

The suffragettes were dislodged only with the aid of the fire hose.

Others of the suffragettes threw missiles which struck windows in the train, in which Premier Asquith was departing from the city after the meeting. Several of them were arrested.

ARBITRATORS AGREE.

The board of arbitration, consisting of Messrs. R. A. Ross, of Montreal, for the city, A. K. Kirkpatrick, Kingston, for the Street Railway Company, and A. Laurin, Montreal, as chairman, concluded its sittings Saturday noon, and came to a unanimous finding: They will report to the City Council that it costs the city 1.30 cents a kilo-watt-hour to supply the extra power required by the street railway company to run its cars. This figure simply represents extra cost for extra power, and is what the street railway company has been eager to ascertain.

The company has been paying 1.66 cents a kilo-watt during the past five years, and the Light, Heat and Power Committee proposed hereafter to charge it 1.87 cents, which figure, of course, includes more fixed charges than the 2.20 cents daily. The street railway company will now ask the council to supply it with power at the latter figure.

TOLD IN THE TWILIGHT.

On and after MONDAY, Sept. 20th there will be a ten minute car and Portmouth cars will run on Princess St. and give a ten minute service, passing the clock at the hour and every ten minutes after. Cars will meet at the junction where transfer can be made downtown by mutual consent. This change in service is made at the suggestion of a great many of the patrons of the road who believe that a ten minute service in one direction will be more convenient than a twenty minute service as formerly operated during the winter months.
