SYDENHAM IS LIVELY IMPROVEMENT MADE TO THE VILLAGE.

Bank Manager's Automobile Destroyed by Fire—Two Young Men Strike a Paying Mine—The Crop Conditions.

Sydenham, Sept. 18.—The village still shows signs of its vacation season, many holiday visitors still lingering. The hot, warm days are here again after a severe spell of November chills, which sent many of the lake shore dwellers scurrying home.

The schools are again in full swing, the Public School, under the able principalship of Thomas Maxwell and the High School with M. R. Reid at its head. Four o'clock every day makes the village lively as the hundreds of bright, happy boys and girls scurry their way down to the post office seeking letters and missives from home and friends and the aeres have a lively time in the post card business. The element walk has been extended almost to the High School to the delight of the pupils, who number over 150.

Sydenham Lake has furnished some good fishing this summer. Many bass of two, three and four pounds and pike of seven and nine pounds have been caught. No End To Coal.

If the figures presented to the British Science Association in regard to the coal supply of the West turn out to be correct, that part of the Dominion has little need to worry about keeping warm.

L. G. Porter told the assembled scientists that Alberta had four thousand million tons of anthracite, eighty thousand million of bituminous, and the same of lignite. He estimated the anthracite on the Pacific Coast at only ten million tons, but balanced that with an estimate of two thousand million of bituminous and half that of lignite. In the far north he thought there was fifty million tons of bituminous. These figures are so large as to be beyond realization, but a measure is supplied by our annual consumption which is about twenty million tons. So that Alberta has enough by a long way to supply the Dominion's present consumption for about four thousand years.
