Not content with torturing men by having their hands and feet cut off (the bleeding stumps then being plunged into boiling pitch), he mistook to his lust for blood by ordering the death of all the captured women to be drawn.

400 MOORS SLAIN.

Madrid, Sept. 22.—The latest despatches from Melilla state that more than 400 Moors were killed in Tuesday's battle, including some of the principal chiefs. The celebrated chief, Mizian, was captured. The fighting was continued yesterday.

Mrs. Vedder, a sister of Oswald Boultbee, recalled the drowning of her brother and John Kennedy, of Jordan, Ont., during a storm. She hoped the bodies might be found along the south shore.
