**WAS INSTANTLY KILLED**

**JUMPED FROM A SWIFTLY FLYING TRAIN.**

Though Cab Was Filled With Smoke Engineer Turned Back Throttle and Saved His Life.

Montreal, Sept. 23.—While the Montreal-Ottawa express on the North Shore line of the C.P.R. was running at about forty-five miles an hour between St. Augustine and St. Scholastique, at 9:50 o'clock last night, a plug blew out on the engine and instantly the cab was filled with searing steam.

Fireman Edward Edwards, Ottawa, jumped for his life but was instantly killed by the fall.

With great presence of mind Engineer John Wilson threw back the throttle and then escaped from the cab. He crawled along the running board until the train came to a standstill about a mile further along. The accident is similar to the one that caused the big smash at the Windsor station some months ago.

**A TRAMP FOUND DYING**

Beside G.T.R. Tracks at Rideau—Died Later in Hospital.

Early Thursday morning the engineer on a G.T.R. freight train going east noticed a man lying on the side of the track, near Rideau station. He notified an up freight train at the next station, and the latter was stopped and the man taken aboard the engine and brought to the junction, where he was removed to the general hospital in James Reid's ambulance. Dr. W. G. Anglin, G.T.R. surgeon, was called, and attended the patient, whom he found to be in a dying condition. He said the man had been stricken with apoplexy. Death ensued at 7:45 a.m.

There was nothing on the clothes of the deceased to identify him. There is no doubt he was a tramp, judging by his appearance. He was about five feet, seven inches in height, weighed 130 pounds, was of dark complexion, with full beard and gray eyes. He wore a blue serge coat and waistcoat, badly worn, light flannel shirt, grey and dark striped Kentucky jeans, new boots, pair of odd grey woolen socks (top of one brown) and tweed peaked cap. In his pockets were found a handkerchief and some tobacco.

Dr. Mitchell, coroner, was notified, but deemed an inquest unnecessary. The body bore no marks of injury. Evidently the man had fallen unconscious beside the tracks while walking.

It is alleged Hamilton, a year ago, married Miss Ring, Ottawa, that she died in about a month and that despondency at her death led to his rash act of this afternoon.
