STICK IN HIS NECK

WHILE IMBEDDED THE MAN WALKS TO HOSPITAL.

Peculiar Accident to Arthur Hazelwood at A. F. Rutter's Farm on Kingston Road.

Toronto, Sept. 24.—A most peculiar accident, which will probably result fatally, occurred on Thursday, on the farm belonging to A. F. Rutter, on the Kingston road. Arthur Hazelwood, the manager of the farm, was picking apples, when the limb upon which he was standing, broke. He fell to the ground, a distance of about fifteen feet. In some way, however, a stick, a foot long, and sharp-pointed, stuck in his neck. When he struck the ground the stick was forced into his neck and down through his body, where it was buried. He was taken to the car and brought to the general hospital. With the stick still in his body he walked into the institution, and after he had told his story, was hustled to the operating room. How the man was able to walk is a puzzle to the doctors. Small hopes are held out for his recovery. Hazelwood is thirty-seven years of age and is married.

SCHOONER IN A SQUALL.

Ford River Was Stripped of Her Sails.

The schooner Ford River ran into a heavy squall, yesterday, while on her way to Charlotte, loaded with feldspar, and was stripped of part of her canvas and was compelled to return to Kingston. She had on a cargo of feldspar for Charlotte, which she loaded at Richardson's wharf. The accident is a most unfortunate one for Capt. C. Daryeau, as he will have to send out of town to secure new sails, and this will cause quite a delay. He may be able to secure the sails off the schooner Maxwell, which was wrecked near Cleveland a short time ago.

The steamer Ramona will complete its Thousand Island season on Sunday, and return here on Monday to be laid up.

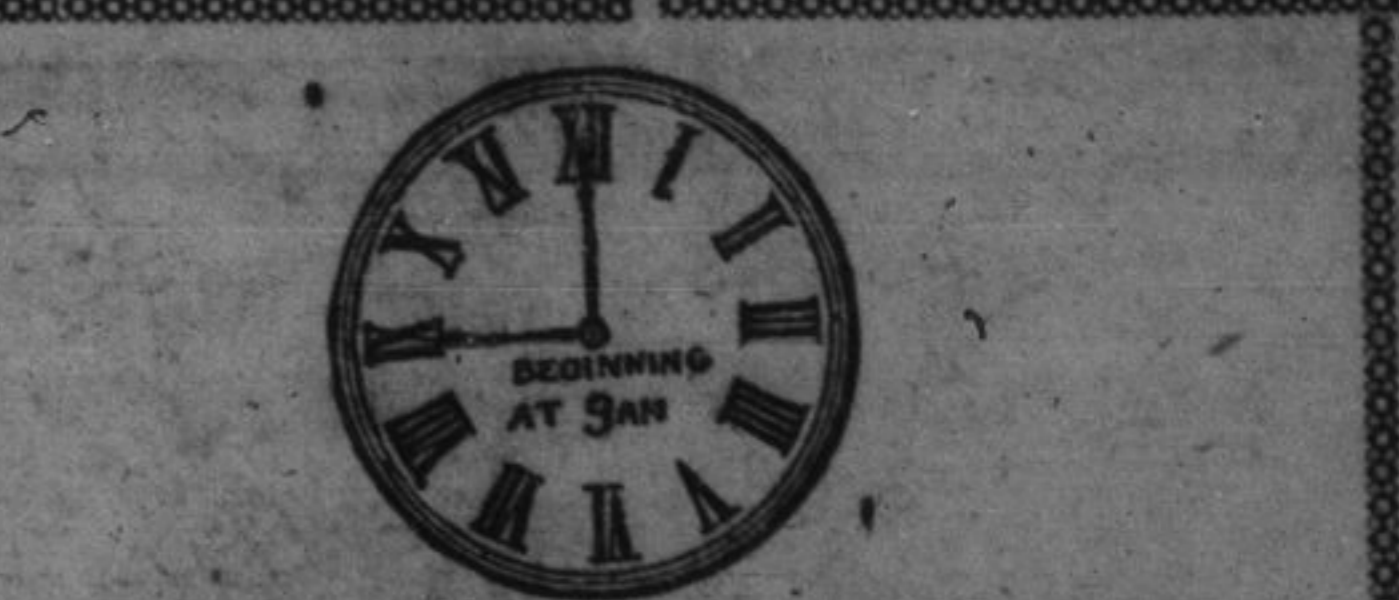
The steamer New Island Wanderer will run the Thousand Island mail route until November 1st. In the meantime the steamer America will continue on the Cape Vincent route.
