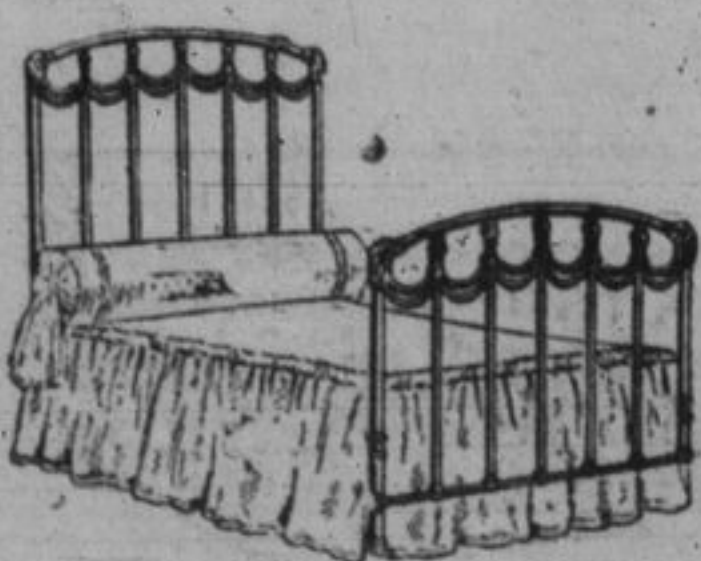

# SON IS MAKING READY TO DON RAILROAD MANTLE OF FATHER.

### HARRIMAN STARTED HEIR AT FOOT OF LADDER.

Walter Eventually to Handle the Reins—Success is Predicted For 17-Year-Old Boy Who Has His Father's Traits.

Walter Averill Harriman, the eldest son of the dead railway king, to-day, at seventeen years of age, finds himself confronted with the absolute necessity of preparing to master the intricacies of railroading in order that a few years hence he may step in and seize the reins of management that death took from the well-trained hands of his father.

Although the young man to whom will eventually fall the management of the billion dollar interests of his father is well educated and knows something of railroading, he readily admits that he is at present incapable of the management of the gigantic system of roads his father built up and that he must first learn the railroading business thoroughly before he attempts to direct them.

Realizing with characteristic keenness of perception that his days of activity were crawling to a speedy close, and that it would be necessary for his elder son to prepare to shoulder the burdens death would place on him, Mr. Harriman some months ago started the boy off on a career of railroading, sending him west first, to aid the surveyors, and later to enter the shops, and then to run a locomotive. Mr. Harriman had planned to have his son work in each branch until he reached the top.

Young Harriman was at work in the west when the news of his father's serious illness reached him, together with a hurry call to the bedside of his father. Mr. Harriman loved Walter greatly and hoped to live to see the day when the boy would be as great an organizer and railroad man as himself. He had hoped that his ocean to ocean railroad route would be carried through and improved by Walter and his plans for a great system circling the entire nation be put in realization.

Walter Harriman has many of the characteristics of his father. He is not boastful, he is thoughtful, not talkative, and a good listener. He is remarkably decisive, much as his father was. He makes up his mind quickly and acts accordingly. He does not revel in the luxury that some



might think his fortune would lead him into. He thinks no more of riding in the ordinary passenger coach, or smoker, of a railroad, than the hardened commuter does.

He is never obtrusive. His quietness and reserve are illustrated in the fact that few of the conductors on the trains that he frequently used from Jersey City to Arden were aware of his identity. One day, in the hurry to get a train, he failed to secure a ticket. He explained to the conductor that he did not have any cash and therefore could not pay his fare. The ticket agent, he explained, would have trusted him for the ticket, as he was the son of Mr. Harriman. The conductor was surprised, bowed deferentially, and said that he, too, would trust him. From that incident young Harriman became known to some of the conductors.
