

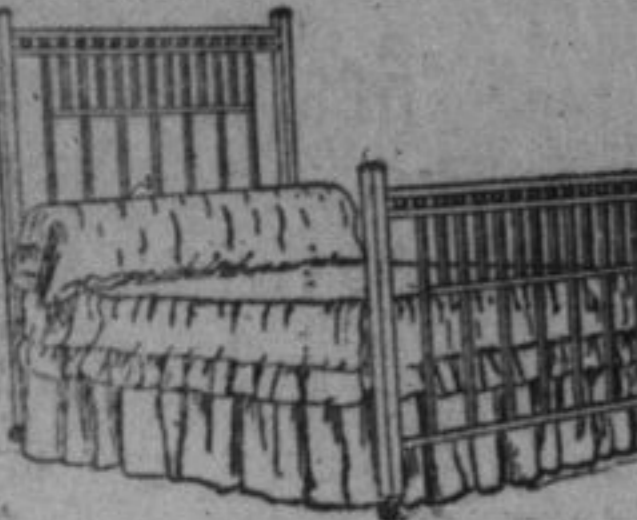

### TILL AFTER MIDNIGHT

### THE BUSY CITY COUNCIL DELIBERATED.

Dr. A. R. B. Williamson Appointed Medical Health Officer and A. H. Muir City Auditor—Revised Noise By-Law Passed.

It was twenty minutes past midnight before the city council closed its Monday night session. The budget of business was considered, the chief items of which were:

The receiving of the water works superintendent's resignation.

Hearing a deputation asking for liquor license reductions.

Appointing Dr. A. R. B. Williamson as medical health officer.

Appointing A. H. Muir as city auditor.

Deciding to submit a by-law to the people for the raising of \$5,500 by debenture for a fire engine.

Passing a more drastic noise by-law—the one with the comma.

Passing the second reading of a by-law to reduce the laundry tax from \$50 to \$10.

Passing fire, department rules and regulations in by-law.

In attendance at the meeting were: Mayor Gouper and Alds. Angrove, Elliott, Givens, Graham, Hanley, Hart, Hoag, Kent, McCann, McKay, Nickle, Rigney, Robertson, Tweedell.

Communications Read. These communications were referred to committees:

Report from arbitrators re cost of street railway power.

I. Zaeks and others re by-law prohibiting the playing of gramophones, etc.

From R. Meek, secretary of House of Refuge, asking that the medical health officer be required to attend the House of Refuge inmates.

The single tax association of Ontario re amendments to the assessment act.

Thomas Hewitt, superintendent of water works, tendering his resignation.

J. J. Druce, re water service at his residence on Montreal street.

Donnelly Salvage and Wrecking company re the rental of the water works wharf.

Superintendent Hewitt's resignation read as follows:

"I respectfully tender my resignation as superintendent of water works. One reason is I am not satisfied with the way Prof. Willhofft was asked to test the water works pumps, or the report made to the water works committee. I hope the council will act upon my resignation at an early date."

The Donnelly Wrecking company claimed that the water works committee had not treated it fairly in re-warding the wharf to the company, pointed out that the life of a wharf was from ten to fifteen years, and this wharf was nineteen years old, and therefore completely and naturally rotted above the water-line, and it would have been so even if it had not been in use. The company asked council to further investigate before taking action to deprive it of the wharf.

Manager Folger, of the light department, reported that it would cost \$2,500 to erect and secure necessary equipment for fifteen new arc lamps for the streets. Fifty could be put in it for \$4,000. For the present, he advocated installing five arc lamps now on hand at the plant, which could be erected for \$75. These could be used till the end of the year. Next a ring it would be necessary to replace all the direct current open arc lamps. The fire and light committee will deal with the matter at once.

Finance Report. The finance committee made the following recommendations:

That the garbage committee be reinstated, and report as to the efficiency of the experiment for the last two months, and their recommendation for future garbage system, and that the accounts of Messrs. Reeves and Theriault, contractors, be referred to this committee.

On the communication of R. J. Armstrong, asking for rebate of business tax, that on the advice of the city solicitor, the request be not granted.

That A. H. Muir be appointed permanent city auditor, at a salary of \$800 per year, and that he is not to engage in any other occupation other than the work of this office.

That Dr. A. R. B. Williamson be appointed medical health officer at a salary of \$500 a year.

That in consideration of the resolution of council re funds for canvassing for permanent pavements, the necessary funds be granted, the sum not to exceed \$100.

present officials could be appointed to do the city auditing. One of the collectors, he suggested, might be appointed. It costs nearly \$4,000 to collect the revenue of the city, which was too much. He knew of a man who would collect the revenue of the city for \$2,500 and supply his own help.

The mayor stated that according to law the city could not appoint one of its staff as auditor. That was out of the question.

Then Ald. Graham asked that the appointment of an auditor be delayed. He moved that the council appoint a committee, re-organize the civic staff, and that the clause relating to the appointment of an auditor be struck out.

Ald. Elliott held that Ald. Graham had made too rambling a statement. Let him come out and name the ones he thought could be dispensed with on the city buildings staff. If he himself was after any officials, he wouldn't be afraid to name them.

Ald. Graham withdrew his motion when he learned that nothing could be gained by pressing it.

The garbage question was briefly discussed, and Ald. Elliott was added to the committee.

The noise by-law changes received an airing and Ald. Graham called for the yeas and nays on the adoption of the changes recommended by the city solicitor. These changes were adopted.

Ald. Angrove, Graham, Craig and McCann voting nay. The vote was 11 to 4.

Concerning Other Reports. Ald. McKay asked the chairman of the board of works to give some information about the oiling of the streets, and how the dust was to be kept down.

Ald. Graham said that only two coats of oil had been given so far. Another coat had to be given. He had been told by one resident of Brock street that the oiling was the best thing ever done, and had benefited the road surface greatly, for it made it harder.

On recommendation of the fire committee, the council decided to introduce a by-law for the purpose of submitting to the electors the question of raising \$5,500 for a new steamer for the fire department.

The waterworks committee report contained the following: Your committee has been unable to arrive at a satisfactory arrangement with the Donnelly company regarding the city's wharf property at the foot of West street, the company's final offer of \$275 of July 3rd, being declined by the committee on account of the unwillingness of the company to comply with the city's terms. Your committee is of the opinion that the property should be utilized profitably, and award prizes to the winners in their contest, which closes November 30th, 1909, in amounts of one dollar each, up to seven hundred dollars, in cash.

until the next meeting of council, when the result will be uncertain, as the vote will be very close, in fact it may result in a tie. At the outset, Ald. Elliott charged Ald. Kent with unfair tactics in moving a second reading of the by-law "after counting noses," and finding that his side had a majority, Alds. Kent and Nickle repudiated any such act on their part.

A clause was added to the by-law, providing that no person shall be entitled to a laundry license until the police location is approved by the police commissioners.

On motion of Alds. Nickle and Rigney, the medical health officer was made medical attendant of the House of Refuge, and will report once a week to the secretary on the condition of the health of the inmates.

### INVERARY ASSAULT CASE.

Three Men Fined and Bound Over to Keep Peace.

At the court house on Monday afternoon, Leoman Young, Edward Smith and Albert Van Volkenburg, of Inverary, were each fined \$2 and costs and bound over in \$50 bonds to keep the peace for a year, and all for indulging in a good, old-fashioned scrap, after the Storrington fair. Van Volkenburg had his thumb so badly bitten by Young that he showed a badly swollen hand and forearm to the magistrate, and William Young, the brother of Leoman Young, had his nose broken in the fracas.

The first case was Mrs. L. Young, on behalf of William Young, a minor, against Smith and Van Volkenburg, for aggravated assault, and a counter charge was laid against Charles Young for the same offence.

Witnesses appeared for Smith and Van Volkenburg, and W. Balfour Mudge for the Youngs.

In all, twelve witnesses were examined by both sides, and no two had the same story of the scrap, one side denied hitting the other, and the other denied hitting it. Finally Magistrate Hunter and J. May got together and arrived at the above verdict.

The case was an interesting one to the people around the north shore, who were out in large numbers to hear the trial. The light started over the outting of some harness of Smith's by some one, and was blamed on Young. This started the scrap, early in the evening and it did not end until after ten o'clock.
