The American Association baseball season closed, Sunday, after a close contest with Louisville, the pennant winner, and Milwaukee in second place.

Lyons, the crack wing man of the Hamilton Tigers Football Club, broke his wrist while at practice, Saturday afternoon, and will be out of the game this season.

The University of Chicago rugby team is practicing, behind locked gates, with members of the student body acting as guards to keep away spying coaches from other teams.

Howa may have a colored player, on his football team, this current season, for the first time in nine years. Alexander, a Des Moines negro of much ability on the gridiron, came out for practice and looks like a good line-man.

Manager Ganzel, of the Rochester baseball team, purchased a new hat for each and every individual on the Toronto team for their assistance in landing them in the pennant berth by the sound thrashing they gave Newark.

In Ottawa hockey circles it is well known the players who made up the "Wanderer" team are at logger heads. Ross and Small have declared they would never again play on the same team with Gardner Johnson as a G.T.R. conductor, and will hardly be able to play.

The Ottawas are in favor of the Interprovincial Rugby League joining hands with the O.R.F.U., but are not in favor of expanding the senior series, believing four clubs all that the interprovincial can hope to support in a senior series. Five or six clubs, the Ottawas believe, would hurt, rather than benefit the game.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother, or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader to good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price, \$1.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
