Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Do minion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain condiprother or sister of intending home-

Duties.—Six months' residence apon three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres . solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sis-

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price. \$3.00 per acre.
