WILL TICKET TRAMPS.

intends to Reform Poor Laws of England.

London, Sept. 28 .- John Burns, gland's business minister, has undertaken the job of his life. He is lanning to reform the administration of the poor laws in England, and as About \$100,000 to His Credit a preliminary he has had the local government board, over which he preides; prepare a comprehensive report showing the discrepancies in administration and the weak points which nust be dealt with.

The first thing that strikes one is the steady and rapid increase in pauperism, and the next is that the proportion is so much greater in some districts than in others. The latter's especially noticeable in London, where even adjoining districts which are inhabited by much the same class of people show startling differences in the proportion of population.

In 1870 the mean number of perons in receipt of poor relief in England and Wales gave a ratio of 44 per advertising offered to foretell future the minimum of 21 per 1,000 was eached; but since 1901 there has been a steady increase, until this year it stands at 23 per 1,000.

> An inquiry into the reason for the ncrease reveals that it is undoubteddue to the policy of those charged with the administration of the poor law. In districts where the old theory of administration—that the condition of the pauper should be a little less comfortable than the laborer outside of the workhouse-has been preserved, there has even been a slight fall in the proportion of pauperism to the population. In districts where the sohas been to make the pauper far more comfortable than he could hope to be f he worked for his living, there has been a remarkably rapid rise.

Most of the reports received from the agents of the local government board omment on the increase in vagrancy, and some of them give really alarmng figures, but it is pointed out by the compilers that these figures are altogether unreliable, and that a uni form system of reckoning must be adopted. Thus, for instance, one inspector who deals with three or four counties gives the number of vagrants admitted in a year to the casual wards in his district as 296,094, while another refers to the admission of 3,899 as "a sad phase of the problem," and declares that there are 12,369 vagrant women in his district Now, as a matter of fact, the number of vagrants leeping in all the casual wards of the country seldom exceeds 12,000 on any one night, of whom about 1,000 are women and 400 chil-

It must be remembered that tramps are like a stage army. They are counted over and over again. Ten ramps passing from casual ward casual ward and being counted in each dian steamer with 200 passengers on will figure as 2,500 persons in course of the year. This is one of the things that Mr. Burns has set out to reform. He realizes that he must have accurate figures showing what problem is before he works out comprehensive plan to deal with it. and I am now told that he is working on a plan by which all the vacrants of the country will be registered and furnished with indetity tickets. Thus a man going on a tramp will have to show his ticket and tell where slept the night before when he plies at a casual ward for shelter, and in this way it will be possible avoid counting him many times in the course of the year. It will also be possible by this means to separate the habitual tramp from the honest workingman who is making his way from town to town in search of a job.
