## NEWS OF THE WORLD

### OCCURRENCES RECOUNTED IN BRIEF FORM.

### Matters That Interest Everybody

—Notes From All Over—Little of Everything Easily Read and Remembered.

The Montreal board of trade has decided not to co-operate in a demand to have the German surtax removed.

Negotiations are now afoot between the Canadian Pacific railway company and the mechanical employees of the Norman Livingston. Windsor, was sentenced to one year in the Central prison for theft of forty-five pounds of butter from a farmer's rig.

Charles Keenan, an engineer on the Bangor and Arisook railway, was killed, Wednesday, when his train crashed into a washout in Maine.

The New York Herald is paying Dr. Cook \$25,000 for the "Conquest of Polo." It cost the Herald \$3,000 for Dr. Cook's first cabled story of his discovery.

Waukegan township voters have presented a petition for it, and the council has passed a by-law for a vote on local option in the townships of Crowland and Bertie.

After smouldering for a month, the Paraguan revolt has broken out in different parts of the country and today, the government's survival is considered doubtful by other South American republics.

Braithwaite, one of Captain Bernier's crew, writing by the Arctic relief vessel, Jeanie, on September 6th, says that the Arctic will reach Quebec by the middle of October.

The new twelve-cent stamp, the issue of which has been authorized, will probably bear the face of Martha Washington. This is the first time that a woman's face has been on a government stamp.

The Neptune, which, when completed, will be the most powerful warship afloat, was launched from the government dock yard, Portsmouth, England, by King Edward's sister, the Duchess of Albany, in the presence of a huge gathering of distinguished naval officers, politicians and society people.

Robert C. Sinclair, a well-known real estate man and broker, was found dead, on Thursday morning, in the rooms of the Toronto Whist Club, of which he was a member. He was about forty-six years of age and unmarried.

J. A. O'Brien has sold his Young O'Brien silver property, on Gillespie Limit, for \$400,000. The names comprising the purchasing syndicate include Messrs. James A. Brook, Montreal; Shiras Ogilvie, Milton, Ontario; Alex. Pringle, Charles Smart, J. P. Black, James Robinson, Victor E. Mitchell and others.

The Silver block, Thamesville, Ont., was destroyed by fire, on Wednesday night. The fire is supposed to have started in a store, Mr. and Mrs. Muckle, wife and son, just escaping the flames, not having time to get their clothes, and little or none of their furniture being saved. The total loss is about \$5,000, insured.

Northern Maine is being swept by a flood, which already has resulted in one death, caused widespread damage to railway property and crops, isolated a number of towns, and driven scores from the low lands. Forty guests of the Silver Lake hotel at Kalkanin Iron Works are camping on the hills for fear the hotel will be swept away.

Frank E. Songrave, the Providence, R.I., astronomer, whose calculations relative to Halley's comet, have attracted world-wide attention, announces the correction of a slight error in his calculations, have developed the discovery that May 1963, 1910, the comet will sweep across the plane instead of clearing it. The earth and comet will meet on the same plane, but not in the same path. There will be distance at the nearest point of 13,000,000 miles between the two.

### N. A. Rhodes Dead.

Rhodes, vice-president of the Rhodes, Curry & Co., president of the Canada Electric Co., and a member of the board of governors of Acadia university, died at five o'clock this morning, aged sixty-four years.
