### Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon each cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within five miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along the homestead. Price, \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to clear homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.

### COMMITTED FOR TRIAL

#### CASE OF JAMES McMANUS IN POLICE COURT.

He is Accused of Assaulting George Snowden, at the Locomotive Works, Some Weeks Ago—Snowden Was Struck on the Head.

With his head bandaged, George Snowden, who has been confined to the general hospital for several weeks, as a result of injuries sustained at the locomotive works, was able to appear in the police court, this morning, when James McManus, also employed at the works, was arraigned on a charge of assaulting him. The case was adjourned several times, as Snowden was unable to appear. J. L. Whiting appeared for the prosecution, and J. M. Mowat appeared for the defence, and entered a plea of "not guilty."

George Snowden was called by Mr. Whiting. He said he was employed at the locomotive works, but could not say how he met with the injuries. "I do not remember," he said, "I was rendered unconscious and taken to the hospital."

Asked about what led up to the trouble, witness said that he was at work on top of a tank, and McManus struck him once on the neck and on the side of the face, with a piece of coal. Witness told him to stop, or he would kick him. Witness caught hold of McManus by the back of the neck, and pushed him away. After this, he went back to his work on the tank, when he was struck again, in the back of the head. He did not see who it was who had struck him.

To Mr. Mowat, witness said he had been employed at the locomotive works for nine months. He came out from the old country about six weeks ago, and served three years with the battery. "Have you not had considerable trouble with the men at the works?" "No trouble at all."

"Who was the boy you struck with the iron pipe, and cut his leg open?" Witness said that there was no such occurrence. It was not true that he had assaulted a boy in this way.

Witness admitted that he had kicked McManus, about two weeks before this accident, but that this was only in fun. Mr. Robinson, foreman in the boiler shop, at the locomotive works, said that he asked McManus how it happened, and McManus admitted striking Snowden. McManus said that Snowden had choked him, and he had hit him. Witness said that he then discharged McManus for his conduct. Snowden met with his injuries in the tank room. The foreman of this department was away on this day, and witness had to look after the work in that department. Witness said that there had been no complaints about Snowden, from other men in the shop.

This concluded the evidence, and the magistrate said that he would commit McManus to stand trial before a judge and jury at the next assize court.

London Graphic. The Caspian sea, as Herodotus said 2,000 years ago, "a sea by itself, having no connection with any other." Every schoolboy knows that now, but it is remarkable to find Herodotus saying so, because centuries after his time such authorities as Strabo and Ptolemy believe that it was connected with the northern ocean by a long and narrow gulf. Geography seems to have had a setback in the interval through false information received at the time of Alexander's conquests.

Herodotus says that the Caspian's length was fifteen days' voyage with a rowboat, its breadth eight days'. Since the actual figures are 750 miles and 400, this shows that a rowboat of the time did fifty miles a day.
