"Mooney" Gibson, a London, Ont.
 Man is Picked As the Man
 Who Will Turn the Trick.
 "Mooney" Gibson will be the man
 that will win the world's series for
 Pittsburgh from Detroit," said De
 Wolf Hopper, the greatest baseball fan
 on the stage. Mr. Hopper ought to

 stick to the bases pretty close. Pitts-
 burg will out-hit the Detroit team,
 and this, combined with Gibson keep-
 ing the runners on bases, means vic-
