

-Had to Hide in the Bush to Avoid the Enemy.

How a British missionary made a hazardous journey in face of a tornado to a scene of an attack on a British force, who were ambushed, is told in the details now to hand of the attack on a British force in Nigeria. The first news came to Minna, a place on the line of the Baro Kano Railway, about 30 miles from the scene of the occurrence, stating that a British force had been cut up at Gussoro by the Tickets may be secured at the difficult and truculent Guari people. This account, which was hurriedly written by the doctor, who was himself wounded, merely stated that the officer in charge was missing, together with a European police officer and a sergeant, and that the writer was himself wounded.
