## HIGHLAND HOST OF KING; MANSION NEAR HISTORICAL CULLODEN

In the matter of holidays King Edward shows himself distinctly conservative. Just as August finds him first at Cowes, then at Marstrand, so September and October see him in the far north among his Highland subjects, wearing the Highland dress and spending long days with the guns or motoring in the mists among the heather. One of the houses which he delights to visit, and of which he is now a guest, is Moy Hall, the picturesque residence of the Mackintosh, which is close by the historic battle field of Culloden, where the clans of the Highland were scattered in flight.

### FIRE APPARATUS TESTED

#### PROVED SATISFACTORY TO THE INSPECTOR.

Thirty-One Hydrants Were Tested  
—The Fire Brigade Did Good Work With the Streams—  
Everything in Good Order.

The fire brigade has been kept pretty busy since Wednesday morning, Robert Howe, inspector of the Canadian fire underwriters' association, is in town and has given the firemen numerous tests. The first was 11:35 o'clock Wednesday morning, when the inspector pulled box 3, at the corner of Queen and Montreal streets. The men from both stations made the run in record time, the official time not yet being nailed out by the inspector. When the men arrived at the above corner nine lines of hose were laid out, five hydrants being used. The pressure was taken on each stream and recorded by Mr. Howe. Two lines at the hydrant inch nozzle gave 62 pounds.

Two lines with one inch nozzle gave 60 pounds pressure. The distance thrown with nine streams in operation was 99 feet, horizontal.

The following hydrants were used: Corner of Montreal and Queen streets, the inspectors gauge and one line of hose; corner of Queen and Bagot streets, two lines; corner of Montreal and Ordinance streets, two lines; corner of Queen and Sydenham streets, two lines, and the corner of Princes and Montreal streets, two lines.

The "yes" test was highly satisfied with all tests.

In the afternoon Mr. Howe, Chief Armstrong and Waterworks Superintendent Hewitt visited thirty-one hydrants throughout the city, testing the standing pressure and pressure with an inch and a quarter opening.

The following hydrants were tested: the first figure being the standing pressure and the second figure with an inch and a quarter opening.

The above test was also entirely satisfactory to the inspector. In the evening the Ontario street station was visited and the apparatus there entirely gone over. This morning the two steamers were taken to Macdonald park for a test.

The chemical engine was also tested on Wednesday. One hundred and fifty feet of hose was used, the discharge lasting three and a half minutes. The stream thrown was eighty-one feet, with 120 pounds pressure at the start. At the end of one minute the pressure was eighty pounds, at two minutes, twenty-two pounds; at three minutes, forty pounds and at three and a half minutes the engine was discharged.

The test for the two steamers resulted as follows, at Macdonald Park this morning:

The Chatham engine was lighted at 9:55 o'clock, and at 9:24 had ninety pounds of steam, and sixty pounds water pressure; at 9:25 o'clock it had 115 pounds of steam and 180 pounds water pressure. One line of hose, 500 feet long, with one and one-eighth-inch nozzle, threw a stream 128 feet horizontally. Two lines of 500 feet each, with the same sized nozzle, threw a stream 123 feet.

The Babcock's were then tested, one taking seventy-three seconds to discharge, throwing a stream of thirty

feet; the second taking eighty seconds to discharge and throwing a stream of seventy-three feet.

All the above tests were quite satisfactory to the inspector.

The following time was given out as official for the run from the lower station to the corner of Queen and Montreal streets, on Wednesday morning: Almonte received at 11:31; first team on scene at 11:38. This is just three-quarters of a minute for the men to get the horses-hitched, get out of the station and run along Ontario street, two blocks, to Queen, and up Queen three blocks, to Montreal, and is certainly a record. Two streams were playing two and three-quarters minutes after the alarm was received, 150 feet of hose being laid in each stream.
