FIRE APPARATUS TESTED

PROVED SATISFACTORY TO THE INSPECTOR.

Thirty-One Hydrants Were Tested—The Fire Brigade Did Good Work With the Streams—Everything in Good Order.

The fire brigade has been kept busy since Wednesday morning, as the fire department of the city has given the firemen numerous tests. The first was 11:35 o'clock Wednesday morning, when the inspector pulled box 3, at the corner of Queen and Montreal streets.

The men from both stations made the run in record time, the official time not yet being handed out by the inspector. When the men arrived at the above corner nine lines of hose were laid out, five hydrants being used. The pressure was taken on each stream and recorded by Mr. Howe.

Two lines with one and one-quarter inch nozzle gave 62 pounds. Two lines with one inch nozzle gave 60 pounds. The distance in operation was 10 feet, horizontal.

The following hydrants were used: Corner of Montreal and Queen streets, the inspector's gauge and one line of hose; corner of Queen and Bagot streets, two lines; corner of Montreal and Ordinance streets, two lines; corner of Queen and Sydenham streets, two lines, and the corner of Princess and Montreal streets, two lines.

The test was highly satisfactory with all tests. In the afternoon Mr. Howe, Chief Armstrong and Waterworks Superintendent Hewitt visited thirty-one hydrants throughout the city, taking the standing pressure and pressure with an inch and a quarter opening.

The following hydrants were tested: (1) The first figure being the standing pressure and the second figure with an inch and a quarter opening.

The above test was also entirely satisfactory to the inspector. In the evening the Ontario street station was visited and the hydrants there were truly gone over. This morning the two steamers were taken to Macdonald park for a test.

The chemical engine was also tested on Wednesday. One hundred and fifty feet of hose was used, the discharge lasting three and a half minutes. The stream thrown was eighty-one feet, with 120 pounds pressure at the start.

At the end of one minute the pressure was eighty pounds, at two minutes, twenty pounds, at three minutes, forty pounds, and at four minutes and a half minutes the engine was discharged.

The test for the two steamers resulted as follows, at Macdonald Park this morning:

The Chatham engine was lighted at 9:15 o'clock, and at 9:16 had ninety pounds of steam, and sixty pounds water pressure; at 9:25 o'clock it had 115 pounds of steam and 180 pounds water pressure. One line of hose, 500 feet long, with one and one-eighth-inch nozzle, threw a stream 135 feet horizontally. Two lines of 500 feet each, with the same sized nozzle, threw a stream 123 feet.

The Youden steamer was lighted at 9:24 o'clock, and at 9:25 had eighty-five pounds steam and 130 pounds water pressure. One line of hose, 500 feet long, with one and one-eighth-inch nozzle, threw a stream 150 feet. Two lines of 500 feet each, with the same sized nozzle, threw a stream 135 feet.

The Babcock were then tested; one taking seventy-three seconds to discharge, throwing a stream of thirty

A SAFE BLOWER

THOUGHT TO BE IN HANDS OF POLICE.

The Chase After Three Other Men is Hot-It is Said Gorman Has Confessed.

Dominion Policeman Foster and Sheriff Wright, of Hull, brought him to Hull this morning, and the chase after the other three men is hot.

In Gorman's possession was found the greater bulk of the swag removed from the safe at Ellard's store, Pickanock, when it was dynamited lately, together with a complete set of appliances which are peculiar to the art of safe blowing, including dynamite caps, fuses and a candle.

Boys after rows, near Wright village, early this morning, saw three men in the woods, and it is thought when they were seen.
