## THE SPORT REVIEW

### SOME POINTERS ABOUT RUGBY KICKING.

Toronto Varsity Team to Play Queen's—Cobb's Batting Percentage is Away Ahead of Wagner's.

Good rugby catchers are scarce. Until a fourteen is sure on punts, the team will be uncertain. Better be in front of a falling ball than under it. Arms, hands and body must form a perfect trap for the kicked ball, around which hands and arms wrap to prevent a rebound.

The team that gets the jump wins. Quick starting is the secret of success. The back field must start like lightning and together, and to get a fast start, the positions taken by sprinters must be adopted. In starting, the player must hold the hips too high or throw the body too far forward. Every muscle must be under control.

The linemen must modify the position, owing to the closeness of the opposing line, and must be ready to resist a forward pull or sudden advance. Therefore the weight must be less upon the hands, and more upon the feet.

Kicking is the spectacular of football and needs long practice. A classy punter, or drop kicker, is a valuable asset. Constant practice may develop a fair performer into a star.

In punting the ball is kicked just before it touches the ground after being dropped. Two styles are followed, the spiral and the end-over-end, which is most effective with the wind. Against the wind only the spiral travels fast. Form is necessary. Speed and distance come with practice. In kicking the spiral, step forward and to the right with the left, which is carried about a yard to the right. Drop the ball as the right foot is swung forward, too turned down.

The leg must be rigid as the ball strikes the instep, in the same position it is held in the hands. Time, place and foot must be just right. Watch the ball all the time. Too near, it pops into the air. It should be met by the foot near the center and the foot must drive straight ahead for an instant, with a quick finish toward the left shoulder, to give the spiral twist.

Varsity's Probable Team.

Toronto Mail and Empire: Varsity's back division will likely be: Dixon, full-back; Gall, right-half; Newton, centre-half, and Lawson, left-half. They have been playing the positions steadily all season and that would seem to indicate that they will be played there. Dixon has been doing good work, and certainly deserves his place. He is a fast runner, a sure catch and good punter, and besides that has a useful habit of backing up the half line when they have any long punts or throws to hand. Newton has also been playing well, his tackling being especially brilliant. Lawson's work during practice has been even better than last year. He has been mowing the second team men down right and left every night in the practice games and will play havoc with the Queen's men if he is in the field. Gall's record has been as good as ever. Foulds will likely play quarter. He was with the second team last year, and has been filling the position ever since the practices started. Bell will be at centre scrumming. There was some doubt as to whether he would be able to play this year, owing to his examination, but he has arranged the matter and is certain to be back in his old position. To the right of him will be Ritchie, and to the left Jones. Kingston and Muir look good for the inside wing positions, as both have been doing well in practice. Kingston is a fast follower and Muir is about the best man for the job that could be selected. Next to them will come Hume and Lajoie, and on the outside will be Gage, and either Henderson or Dixon.
