Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price, \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to clear homestead (patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

POLICE WERE BRIBED

ASTOUNDING SCHEME TO BLACKMAIL WOMEN.

Those Alone at Hotels Made Victims of Man's Apparently Respectful Attention.

Paris, Oct. 9.—Two members of a gang of three swindlers have been arrested in Paris for a series of extraordinary complicated and ingenious swindles perpetrated upon women. The method of operation was curious in the extreme.

One of the gang, who had the manners and appearance of a well-born man, would take up his abode in a fashionable hotel, where he would work his way into the favor of women who were staying there alone. His attentions were of the most correct and straightforward character, and seldom failed to win for him the high regard of his victim.

From the ordinary courtesies and attentions of a fellow-guest, this man would by slow and insidious methods lead up to the stage at which he and the woman would take short walks into the town. A little later these would be extended, until by slow degrees the man would succeed in taking the woman for a long ramble in the woods or hills.

While out on such expeditions they would be confronted by two police officers—in reality two disguised accomplices of the man—who made certain accusations against the couple. This, of course, they stoutly denied, but the "police" showed every indication of taking the couple to the nearest station, where they would be charged. Only the production by the man of all the money he happened to have upon him would cause the "police" to "consider the matter," and they invariably decided the bribe was sufficient.

Hereupon the innocent woman would also empty her purse into the hands of the two "police," and often followed this by taking off all her jewelry and throwing that in with the money.

On these terms they were allowed to go, the "police" promising that no scandal would follow.

But the blackmail did not end there. Hardly had the unhappy woman regained her hotel than the two "police" officers would call on her and appeal for help on the ground that they had been dismissed for accepting the bribe which the woman and her companion had given them. As a rule, further money was paid.

The swindle was only discovered when a woman who had fallen into the hands of these rogues, went to the chief of the Paris detective force and told him the whole story.

Paris, Oct. 9.—A startling incident happened during an exhibition of living pictures at a public hall in Paris last night. The hall was crowded and pictures of the Reims aviation meeting were being shown on the screen when a woman in the audience gave a piercing scream and fell on the floor in a state of wild hysteria. Her husband was also seen to be suffering from great emotion, and the two were taken out.

It was then found that in one of the pictures the woman herself had appeared sitting at the table in a cafe accompanied by a man. The husband is a commercial traveler, and during the aviation week he had away from home on a business trip. His wife supposed to have been in the country with her mother at this time, but picture showed that she had renewed the acquaintance of a former lover, whom she had given up on her marriage.

Her husband stood by furious. "I've just seen her on the screen," he shouted. "She was lunching with a man at Reims when I thought she was staying with relatives in the country during my term of military service. I'll punish her." So much disturbance was made that the performance was stopped while the woman was carried out to the nearest doctor's residence.

When the man and wife reached home a quarrel broke out. The wife laughed at her husband's reproaches, refused to make any explanation, and so infuriated him that he seized a revolver and shot at her. She was not wounded, but was so overcome with emotion that she fainted again and lay prostrate on the floor.

The husband, believing he had shot her, went to the police station and gave himself up, declaring that he had killed his wife.

GUARDED BY SOLDIERS.
Fortune Unearthed in Earthquake Ruins.

Rome, Oct. 9.—The jewelry and other valuables which the military authorities have collected from the ruins of Messina, and for which no claimants can be found are estimated to be worth \$200,000,000.

This vast collection of riches is heaped up in the subterranean vaults of the citadel and in wooden shelters, and is guarded by the gendarmes of Messina, officers who have not even sufficient soldiers to guard the shelters.

In one of these shelters the soldiers have constructed rough shelves, on which diamonds and gold are piled in the most extraordinary manner. A small cardboard box the size of a matchbox, contains a necklace of pearls valued at over \$200,000; between an old pair of boots and a pair of shoes there is a simple envelope containing state bonds of \$400,000 made out to bearer.

In another small wooden box lies a diamond solitaire, worth a fortune, which was registered by the soldiers as white stone. Further on a petroleum can contains gold coins amounting to \$100,000. There are safes unnumbered filled with hundreds of gold watches, rings, chains, bracelets, earrings, pocketbooks and treasures of all sorts.

All these riches have been found in the superficial excavations carried on up to the present, while the wealthier part of the town—the first and second floors and cellars—are still untouched.
