THE OPEN RIFLE MATCH

To Be Held at the Ranges Next Wednesday.

The following are the complete details of the open rifle match to be held at the Barrieffield ranges, next Wednesday afternoon, October 12th. The match will be conducted under D.R.A. rules, the ranges to be 200, 300 and 600 yards. The entrance fee has been placed at fifty cents, and it is hoped that this small fee will not deter anyone who is at all interested in rifle shooting from entering the match. Staff-Serjt. Swaine, the secretary of the meet, will be at the Armories on Monday and Tuesday evenings, to receive entries, and will also receive them at the range until two o'clock on the afternoon of the shoot. Firing will commence at one o'clock, and all competitors should be at the range not later than two o'clock.

As already published, there will be forty cash prizes, ranging from \$5 to \$1, in addition to which there will be the silver cup presented by Major Leslie, R.C.H.A., for the best shot. The prizes will be awarded according to the total scores made at the three ranges. The committee has decided to give three additional prizes to the third-class shots making the highest scores at each range. A third-class shot is one making less than seventy out of a possible 105.

There will also be a bull's-eye contest. To enter this a man will buy bull's-eye tickets at five cents each. Before firing each shot, if he thinks it is to be a bull's-eye, he will declare the shot, giving a ticket to the register keeper. If the shot proves to be a bull's-eye, the man's ticket will be kept, if not, it will be torn up. The prize money assigned to the match will be divided in proportion to the number of successful bull's-eyes each man has made.

As the match has been organized for the purpose of encouraging rifle shooting, it is hoped that there will be a large entry, and it is thought that the opportunity for practice will be well worth the entrance fee, quite regardless of the chance of winning a prize. The several military units and rifle associations will supply their members with ammunition, which may also be purchased on the range.

VARSITY TOOK GAME

DEFEATED QUEEN'S AT SOCCER BY 3 TO 1.

The Toronto Team Played a More Aggressive Game—Queen's Need Practice and a Re-organization.

Varsity association football eleven found little difficulty in defeating Queen's, Saturday morning, by a score of 3 to 1. A large crowd gathered on the lower campus, anticipating an interesting contest, but were disappointed. Varsity served up a good class of ball, their clever combination play and almost incessant aggressiveness won for them well-deserved applause and incidentally a victory. The Toronto men are all heavy and do not hesitate to employ their weight at the proper time, each and every one of them is a strong and sure kick, playing a clean, heady game.

Queen's work was decidedly ragged. There was little combination play and they seemed to be entirely devoid of that continued aggressiveness which characterized their opponents. The entire team requires practice and more practice. The half-back division was poor and of very little assistance to the forwards. Casselman, the new man in goal, made good, handling the majority of them like a veteran. There will be an entire re-organization of the team before it meets McGill.

Play opened with Varsity decidedly on the aggressive, and a pretty piece of combination brought them in close range with Queen's citadel; however, the shot went wide. Again they attacked, but Tremble bawled. Queen's seemed bewildered, and it was after four minutes' play that Langford, on a clean ground drive, sent one past Casselman.

Queen's play for the next eight minutes was of a decidedly ragged variety, with Varsity pressing hard. Queen's was given an offside kick right in front of the goal; the whistle was blown, but Tremble did not get rid of the ball in time, he was checked by Galbraith, who had no difficulty in putting it between the posts. Score: Varsity, 2; Queen's, 0.

After the ball travelled up and down the field several times, on a centre from Foster, Carmichael managed to head in Queen's lonely tally. Varsity, 2; Queen's, 1. The first half ended with scores unchanged.

One minute after play was resumed, Varsity scored on a clean drive. The remainder of this period was somewhat more evenly contested, the ball travelling from goal to goal, but closed with the score remaining unchanged.
