DID UP THE CASHIER
HE WAS A REAL CHEEKY THIEF.

Man Who Pretended to Be Mr. Rea Gets \$178 From Store Cashier in Montreal.

Montreal, Oct. 11.—A man walked into the store of A. E. Rea & Co., St. Catherine street, on Friday afternoon, and, representing himself to the lady cashier as being Mr. Rea, said he wanted \$178 in a hurry. The young lady, it is said by a Presbyterian service man, handed over the money without any hesitation, as the man was well dressed and seemed to be well acquainted with the business.

W. D. Haywood, one of the founders of the Western Federation of Miners, who was one of the three men tried for the murder of Gov. Stoneberg, of Idaho, over two years ago, and against whom Henry Orchard was the chief witness, is announced to speak in Montreal in about two weeks, under the auspices of the socialist labor party. Moyet and Pettibone were the two others tried for murder. Haywood was acquitted, the jury being out twenty-four hours.

It is announced that Andrew Carnegie has made a donation of \$100,000 to McGill, following a promise that if \$500,000 were raised from other sources he would give by giving \$100,000. The \$500,000 came from Lord Strathcona in the summer and Mr. Carnegie fulfils his promise. The whole is part of the \$2,000,000 fund for which McGill has made an appeal.

POLITICS IN PULPIT.

Tammany Candidate Enters Protests in Church.

New York, Oct. 11.—As a Christian gentleman, a son of a Presbyterian doctor of divinity, and a grandson of a Presbyterian doctor of divinity, I protest against bringing dirty politics into the pulpit of this or any other church.

So saying, John B. A. Mullally, a Tammany candidate for the assembly, rose last night and walked out of the Manhattan Congregational church, from the pulpit of which Otto B. Barnard, republican candidate for mayor, and John Purvey Mitchell, republican candidate for president of the board of aldermen, had just delivered campaign addresses.

Cries of "shame, shame!" followed the action of Mullally, and for some moments there was an uproar. Mr. Barnard made no reply, and Dr. Stimson, pastor of the church, said briefly that he believed his congregation wished to be well informed on all municipal affairs, from the conduct of which rightly conceived ideas of morality could not be divorced.

GREAT MICA DEPOSIT.

Prospector Traced Vein For Over Two Miles.

Edmonton, Alta., Oct. 11.—A prospector just in from the Peace River canyon, which lies beyond the great divide a short distance, brings in news of a remarkable discovery of mica in that distant isolated country. He prospected a vein for over two miles, and found it to average about fifty feet in thickness and of unknown depth. The quality is remarkably fine and it can be lifted in great sheets of the purest material. The mica is worth from \$25 to \$100 per ton, a price which makes this mine richer and more important as a commercial commodity than any gold mine discovered. It lies just beyond the divide at the foot of Mount Selwin.

Abdul Hamid Nearly Escaped.

London, Oct. 11.—The Belgrade correspondent of the Telegraph says that Abdul Hamid, the deposed sultan of Turkey, attempted to escape from his villa prison at Salonika. He had a workman brought to do certain repairs. He professed to be annoyed at the man's dirty appearance and ordered him to take a bath before he did the work. While the man was bathing his clothes were taken to Abdul Hamid, who donned them and passed from the garden into the street. There he was recognized by one of the guards and taken back.

He May Succeed.

Montreal, Oct. 11.—Col. R. L. Lessard, C.B.E., A.D.C., head of the permanent corps in Canada, is mentioned as likely to succeed the late Brigadier-General Buchanan in that title, but not necessarily in the same command as a redistribution may take place.

Lieut.-Col. Gordon is mentioned for the vacancy which would thus be created if Col. Lessard moves higher.

A Destructive Hurricane.

Washington, D.C., Oct. 11.—A destructive hurricane was coasted fifty to seventy-five miles west of Key West, this morning, according to advices received by the weather bureau. Hurricane warnings were sent to all parts of Florida and along the coast as far north as Charleston.
