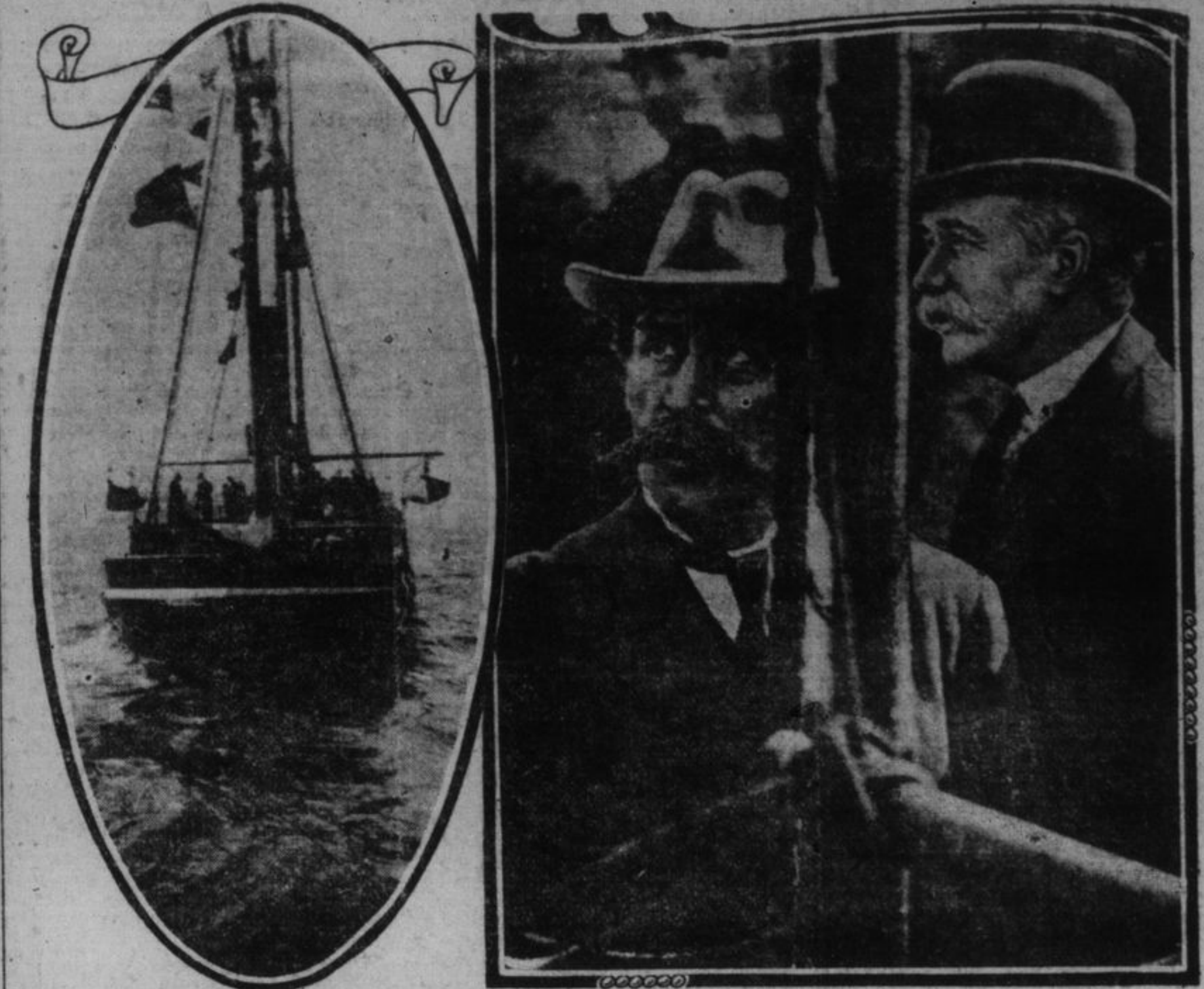

## BACK FROM THE FROZEN FIELDS.

New York, Oct. 9.—Back from the frozen fields of the north, after passing numberless perils without mishap, the Roosevelt, Robert E. Peary's Arctic ship, made her way up the smooth waters of the Hudson river in her part of the Hudson-Fulton celebration only to find the steering gear and other help-ids in the river until it was too late to follow the parade down from Newburg. As the vessel moved up the river Mr. Peary received an enthusiastic reception along the route. With his wife by his side on the bridge he was easily the most conspicuous figure in the parade. All the way land and water vied with each other sending their cheers of congratulation to the black ship whereon the tall military-looking man smiled back his answer to their greetings.
