FATE OF DOMINION TO MERGE INTO REPUBLIC 'TIS THOUGHT.

What Most Americans Believe According to Lord Courtney, Who Writes Remarkable Article.

London, Oct. 12.—Lord Courtney publishes in the Contemporary Review a remarkable article on British relations towards Canada and the United States.

He says the open-eyed recognition of relative development of ourselves and United States ought to have the effect of inducing perpetual peace between us.

It should at once set aside the dream, even if it were ever entertained, of naval predominance on our part to endure from generation to generation.

Discussing relations of Canada to the United States, he recognizes that no American wishes to annex Canada, that most Americans believe that the irresistible force of gravitation will lead the dominion to merge in the republic. He regards this prospect without apprehension, satisfaction, or desire.

He concludes by saying: "It would be bound to the infinite honor of any statesman, whether of Canada or of the United States, who would bring about the extension of the provisions of the treaty of Ghent, so as to preclude in principle an array of armed forces along the line from the Atlantic to the Pacific."

NOT SORRY FOR LOSS.

Ex-Crown Prince Will Not Withdraw Resignation.

Belgrade, Oct. 13.—The ex-Crown Prince George declared to-day, in conversation with Reuters' correspondent, that all rumors of an intention on his part to withdraw his renunciation of his rights to the throne were false.

He acknowledged the existence of certain parties who desired him to withdraw his renunciation, but said he had no connection with them, nor did he consider this question to be subject to his decision at all. Prince George added that there was no truth in the reports of his having quarreled with the Crown Prince Alexander. On the contrary, he and his brother were on the most intimate terms.

With reference to his plans for the future, Prince George was unable to make any statement, but he wished to undertake a journey around the world.

MOTORIST SHOT AT.

Angry Father Resorts to Act of Revenge.

Paris, Oct. 13.—A few days ago a Paris stock broker named Herbaut and a companion, while motoring from Nice to Monte Carlo, were fired upon. The chauffeur was the only one of the party to be hit. A strange sequel to this outrage has just come to light in the form of a letter to a Nice newspaper. The writer declares that he shot at the motorists because he had been nearly over by M. Herbaut and had been abused by him for getting in the way. He also says that people on foot are in constant danger of death from motorists along the roads in that district, and that one of his children narrowly escaped death just before he himself was threatened.

COTE TO BE DEPUTY HEAD.

Minister Practically Confirms Appointment.

Montreal, Oct. 13.—Thomas Cote, who has been prominently connected with La Presse and who was secretary of the deep waterways commission, is to be the new deputy minister of marine and fisheries. He was given a send-off by the press and Mr. Brodeur, the minister of marine, as good as confirmed the news of his appointment.

Evil Of Bad Teeth.

London, Oct. 12.—No fewer than 1,125 out of 1,404 scholars examined at Euston, were found to be medically defective, according to the report of the medical officer of schools. Seventy-two per cent. had dental diseases, and pneumonia, due largely to defective teeth, was much prevalent.

Arrested In A Church.

London, Oct. 12.—Two men were arrested in the old parish church of St. Nicholas, Brighton, yesterday, on a charge of stealing four brass vases, a brass altar cross, and a brass lectern, and re-arranged subsequently at the local police court.

Fatal Fall From A Promenade.

London, Oct. 12.—A child named Alfred Norris was killed at Brighton on Saturday by falling a distance of thirty feet from the promenade. He was walking outside the rails at the time.

Sailor's Marvelous Escape.

London, Oct. 12.—A Norwegian sailor fell from an express train that was travelling at the rate of sixty miles an hour, near Cockburnspath, Berwickshire, but escaped with a broken nose and some bruises.

LIVE STOCK MARKETS.

The Prices Paid at the Various Centres.

Montreal, Oct. 11.—About 1,600 head of butchers' cattle, 100 calves, 2,000 sheep and lambs and 1,475 fat hogs were offered for sale at the Point St. Charles stockyards this forenoon. Good cattle were not too plentiful, and held their price, but the common stock were dull of sale at declining rates. Prime beefs sold at 44c. to a little over 50c. per lb., pretty good animals, 34c. to 41c., and the common stock, 2c. to 3c. per lb. Calves sold at 24c. to 54c. per lb. Sheep sold at about 34c. and lambs at 54c. to 54c. per lb. Good lots of fat hogs sold at 84c. to near 84c. per lb.

The offerings of live hogs at this market during the week consisted of 2,285 cattle, 650 calves, 2,250 sheep and lambs and 2,775 hogs.

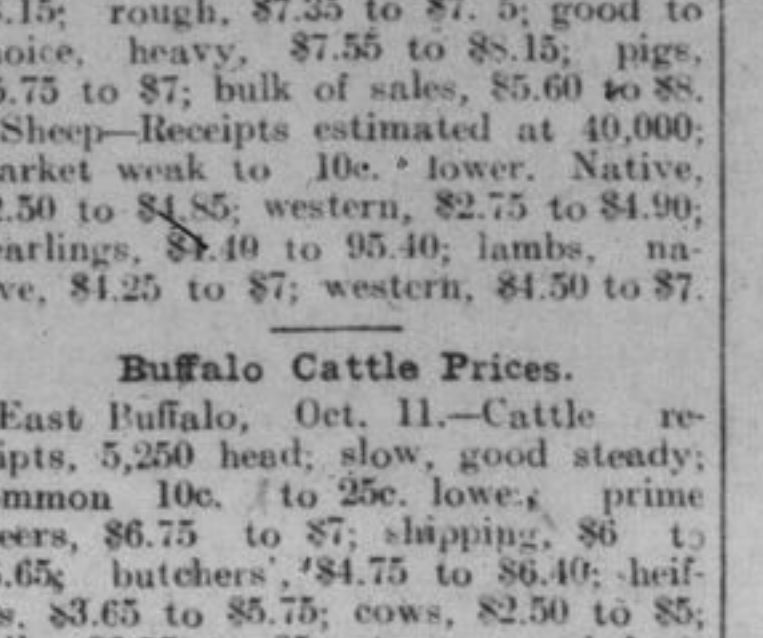
