**A CONFERENCE HELD AT THE ORPHEUM OPENS IN MARINE CIRCLES REGARDING CAMPAIGN FOR INDUSTRIES. AND LARGE CROWDS WERE ALMOST COMPLETE TIE-UP BY THE WEATHER.**

Board of Trade and City Council Members Discuss the Question—Extension of Water Mains Will Improve the Fire Pressure.

At the Board of Trade rooms, last evening, a conference was held between members of the city council and the council of the Board of Trade regarding joint action in an endeavor to bring industries to Kingston. The details of the meeting it was agreed should not be published. However, a forward move was made in regard to active work in seeking out industries, and in looking well after those that seek to establish here. At present several industry promoters want sites and concessions from Kingston. They will be given every possible consideration.

At the Performances Last Evening—A Fine Vaudeville Show Was Given—Everybody Was Pleased.

The Orpheum theatre, Kingston's new vaudeville house, opened its doors for the first time on Wednesday evening. Every available seat was occupied at both performances, and many were left outside, not being able to get in. The theatre is not entirely finished, inside or outside, but is certainly a credit to the city and when fully completed will be one of the finest vaudeville houses in Ontario. The seven hundred people at the first performance were everyone given a comfortable seat. All coughs and head aches were gone away perfectly satisfied with the theatre and more than satisfied with the show.

It Has Been Rough All the Way From Montreal to the Upper Lakes—The Work of Unloading Made Very Difficult.

The rough weather of the past three days has played havoc with the movements of vessels, not only in the Kingston district, but all the way from Montreal to the upper lakes. A few vessels have been able to keep on the move but the majority have had to keep in for shelter.

There has been almost a complete tie-up of the route from Montreal to the upper lakes, remarked a marine man to-day. At the head office of the M.T. Co. word was received from Montreal to the effect that vessels were being tied up there by the storm. The tug Mary P. Hall was compelled to stay over. She was expected to reach Kingston to-day but will not arrive until Friday. The steamer Rosemount and barge Hamilton should have arrived at the M. T. Co.'s elevator on Tuesday but is still in the canal.

The steamer Neepawa passed up Thursday morning.

The steamer Cataract passed down Thursday morning loaded with coal for Montreal.

The steamer Stornout passed up on Monday. She was delayed at Cornwall by the storm.

On her trip on Wednesday morning the steamer Rideau King was down shore but released herself without damage.

The cargo of the steamer Rosemount will be transhipped into barges as soon as she arrives and taken on to Montreal.

The steamer Westmount and barge Quebec, which left here for Fort William, several days ago, are held up at the Soo, and this goes to show that the storm in that centre is as bad as it is here.

St. Francis Steamer Mapleton, tied up, westbound, on her way to Fort William; steamer Belleville, wind-bound, on her way down; steamer Aletha, windbound, cancelled her trip to bay ports on Wednesday afternoon.

Some of the boats swept away by the storm, on Tuesday night, was the Calvin Co.'s boat, and was towed to the city. The other has not been found. Government boats will get to work as soon as the weather is settled.

The steamer Porter has had great trouble in unloading her cargo of coal at the waterworks' wharf owing to the high wind, and this morning the task had to be given up and the vessel went into the slip near the government dry dock for shelter. The wind was so strong that it smashed the steamer up against the wharf.

**Water Main Extension.**

Satisfaction is expressed over the good showing made by the hydrants at the recent fire department test. It was clearly shown that the water pressure was good. There will be an improvement, however, when the projected main extension from West street and up Barric street to Princess street is laid. Then if Princess street is to be paved, the old water main there, which Superintendent Hewitt wanted to replace twenty years ago, will at last have to be renewed with a larger sized pipe. That also will still further increase the water supply and pressure for fire purposes.

**SHOULD BE TAKEN IN.**

**Bicycles Should Not Be Left Out Near Sidewalk.**

The police cannot always find stolen bicycles and the safest way for citizens is not to leave them standing out near the sidewalk for any length of time. People inclined to do this are tempted when they see a bicycle left out in this way.

The lad referred to in yesterday's Whig got his wheel back again, but he was lucky. Had the thief cared to leave the city as soon as he made off with the wheel it is not likely that it would have been recovered. The wheel was not taken out of the city and this favored the work of the police, as they were able to make a thorough search for it.

The theft of wheels gives the police a great deal of trouble every summer, and a lot of this would be avoided if the owners would just be a little more careful and see that the wheels are not left around in this way.




FIGURE 1. FIGURE 2.
