MULLIN'S PITCHING FEAT AT DETROIT.

Open Rugby Play Induces Various United States Colleges to Allow the Game to Be Played Again By Their Students.

Even money now rules in many places on the world's baseball championship series.

An Ontario section of the Amateur Skating Association of Canada will be launched shortly.

Jeffries is firm in his belief that his fight against Johnson will take place at San Francisco.

There will be no change on the Varsity line-up for the game with McGill next Saturday.

Clarke, the great outfielder and manager of the Pittsburgh Pirates, is thirty-eight years of age.

The world's baseball series between Detroit and Pittsburgh will break all records as far as gate receipts go.

Ty Cobb hopes to overtake Hans Wagner in betting in the world's championship games at Detroit.

Ty Cobb and Hans Wagner had not met face to face until the present world's series started at Pittsburgh.

A monstrous bat of Georgia pine has arrived at Detroit, addressed to Ty Cobb from admirers in his native state.

A baseball team of Philadelphia Americans will make a tour of the Pacific coast, playing games from New York to San Francisco.

Ottawa Citizen "Ken" Williams, the best kicker on the Intercollegiate, will again be seen with the Queen's team at Varsity oval Saturday.

Ottawa College has suggested Purford, Lafleur, Shea and Ryan for officials. All are good men and Queen's will probably accept two of them.

Stronach, the Ottawa outside wing man, was hurt rather badly in last Saturday's game with Hamilton. It will be Friday before he will be out at practice again.

Hamilton Tiger officials say that "Davie" Tope will get into the game next week if he is needed. But they had better be careful, for "Davie" has just got married.

Ottawa Free Press: With College and Queen's holding the boards here next Saturday, the rugby performance continues. College looks to have an even chance over the Kingston students and it is hoped they will repeat their performance of 1907.

The Ottawa Citizen says that should an extra game be necessary to decide the Interprovincial rugby championship, it is to be hoped that the Interprovincial officers do not again choose Kingston as the scene of the fray. Well! Well! The Ottawas were beaten in Kingston, and they think this town is a hoodoo.

At San Francisco, "Gunboat" Smith, a seaman from one of the United States cruisers anchored there, scored a knock down in a four-round bout with Johnson, the heavyweight. Coming out of a clinch in the last round, the sailor swung a right overhand chop which took Johnson flush on the chin.

The champion went down flat on his back, and when he recovered his feet he was so dazed that his manager cut the round short.

On Tuesday, the American Baseball League champions outclassed their rivals in every department of the game, and the pitching of George Mullin will make one of the brightest spots in the baseball history of Detroit. It is hard to conceive of any pitcher having his opponents more at his mercy than Mullin did Pittsburgh. There was never a moment when he was not the absolute master of the situation.

Mullin performed a feat that will live long in the annals of baseball, and was frozen in the minds of those who saw it. In the third inning he struck out the mighty Wagner, with two out and men on second and third. That was a mighty feat, but just previously he had struck out Manager Clarke, a hard hitter, with men on first and second.

Pitcher George Mullin, of Detroit, makes no secret of the fact that during last Friday's game at Pittsburgh he missed at least one of the old infielders—the talkative German, Schaefer. "I know that Delehanty is a better batter and just as good a fielder," said Mullin. "I know the shift that 'Hughes' made in our infield gave us the chance to win the pennant; but for all that, in the game with Pittsburgh Friday, there were times when I would have given a good deal to have had the Dutchman come over and say: 'Why don't you pitch ball, you big stiff? That's the way he used to do, and I know he used to help me with his talking and roasting.'

As proof that new style open-play football, brought about by changes in the rules, has made friends among college officials in the south, the announcement is made that at least four institutions have removed the lid which prevented the game being played for several years. Cumberland University authorities at Lebanon, Tenn., consented to launch as formidable an eleven as possible. Millsaps College, a Methodist institution, which has never tolerated athletics of any kind, will send a squad to the gridiron, and eleven flourish again at Alabama Presbyterian College and Mississippi College for the first time in four years. The game has experienced a general revival in the south.
