## J. STANLEY COOK ROBBED THE BANK

HAS BEEN CHOSEN THE GENERAL SECRETARY. ROBBER HAD BEEN HEMMED IN BY PURSUERS.

No New Light on the Negotiations For Closer Business Relations—Rev. Mr. Moore Could Not Believe It.

Montreal, Oct. 14.—The choice of a general secretary of the Federation of Canadian Clubs recently organized in this city, which was left to the local Canadian Club, has fallen on Stanley Cook, assistant secretary of the Board of Trade.

James Ross, president of the Dominion Coal Company, returned to the city, today, from Sydney, but was unable to throw any new light on the progress of the negotiations looking to closer and more amicable business relations between his company and the Dominion Iron and Steel Company. In fact, Mr. Ross jokingly looked to the newspaper men for information. It is stated in banking and financial circles, however, that there is no doubt about the deal going through, but on what terms no one can exactly state as there will be considerable negotiation done before an agreement is reached.

Rev. J. Moore, secretary of the Lord's Day Alliance, is in the city and discussed the announcement, in this morning's despatches, that among the matters to be taken up by the Cobalt branch of the organization was objection to the delivery on Sunday of fresh milk to the Cross hospital, shipped from Toronto. Mr. Moore said he had not heard of it and could not believe it.

### WAS NOT EMPLOYED.

What Several Witnesses Testified To.  
Peterboro, Ont., Oct. 14.—Robert H. Shepherd came up before Police Magistrate Dumble, this morning, on two charges of perjury in connection with his recent Stratton election trial. He did not elect nor plead. J. G. M. Wilson and James Kendry, ex-M.P.s, swore that they did not have any arrangement with Shepherd that he should pretend to be a supporter of Mr. Stratton, and by working around his committee-room obtained information to be used against him. Court adjourned at one o'clock.

### HE IS IN TROUBLE.

The King Terrified at the Lively Episodes.  
Madrid, Oct. 14, via Sonydax.—Information received, today, from Spanish court circles, says King Alfonso is terrified at the storm of mystic arising by the execution of Francisco Ferrer, at Barcelona, yesterday. He is denouncing the ministry on whose advice he allowed the court-martial sentence of death to be carried out, declaring they kept him in ignorance of the real state of the public mind, not only in Spain, but in all Europe. It is reported the Spanish cabinet offered to resign, but that Alfonso decided that his ministers remain at their posts and help extricate him from the difficulty.

### Recovered Damages.

Braintree, Ont., Oct. 14.—Miss Elizabeth Wright, of Haysville, was awarded \$1,000 damages in her breach of promise case against Frederick Bastedo, a prosperous farmer of McLean township. The marriage was to have taken place September, last year, but was postponed three or four times without reason, on one occasion the bride-to-be having invited the guests and the feast spread when defendant failed to appear.

### MUST PAY CLAIM.

The Award of the Official Referee.  
Toronto, Oct. 14.—By a judgment of the official referee, in the Ontario Bank case, given this morning, the shareholders of that defunct institution met—The Bank of Montreal's claim of \$1,819,972. Mr. Kappie finds that the money was borrowed only to satisfy the claims of depositors, whose claims are prior to the shareholders and that, therefore, the agreement is valid and binding as a basis for the accounting between the banks. The question of the exact amount to be paid is yet to be decided, but the amount of the claim is expected, virtually to stand. In his judgment, Mr. Kappie points out that the directors, by making illegal purchases of the bank's own stock, had materially reduced the bank's capital.

### The End Of Despotism.

Mukden, Oct. 14.—Despotic government in China ended, yesterday, when all the legislatures of the self-governing provinces throughout the empire held their first meetings preparatory to the drafting of a constitution for the empire.

### New Cunard Line Head.

London, Oct. 14.—A. A. Booth has been elected chairman of the Cunard Steamship Co. Ltd. He succeeds Sir William Watson, who died a short time ago. Thomas Royden has been elected deputy chairman in place of Mr. Booth.

On account of rain the Detroit-Peterburg game scheduled at Detroit today was postponed until Saturday.

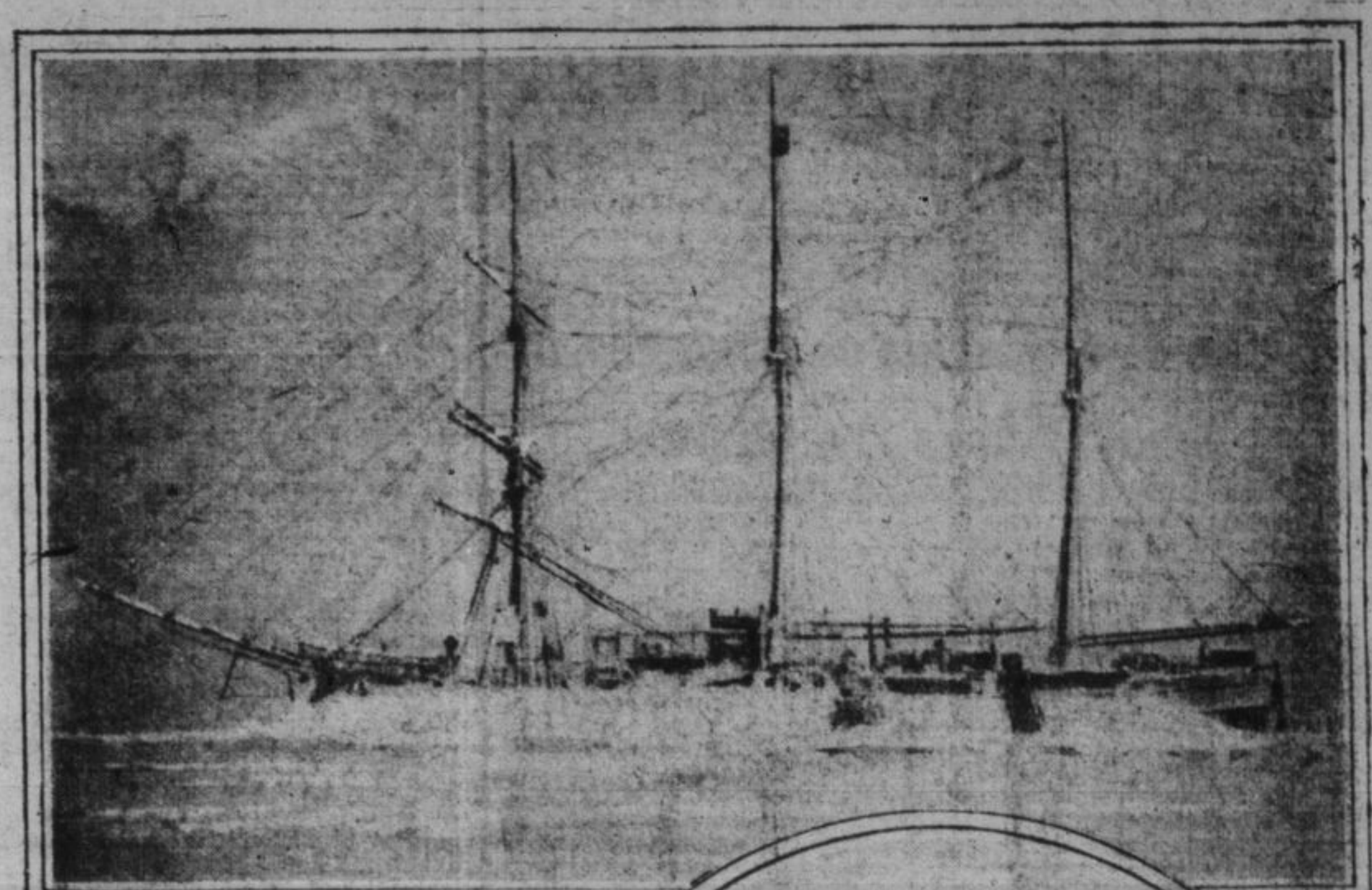

## CAPT. BERNIER SIDES WITH DR. COOK



THE CANADIAN SHIP ARCTIC IN WINTER QUARTERS NEAR MELVILLE ISLAND

Ottawa, Oct. 14.—Capt. Bernier, Canada's now famous Arctic explorer, arrived in the city, today, to make his official report to the government. He had an interview with the premier, this morning, and will be the guest of the Canadian Club on Saturday. The captain has maps of 500,000 acres of new northern territory which he has annexed for Canada. Speaking of the Cook-Pearry controversy, he sides strongly with Cook, though not doubting that Peary also made the discovery of the pole. He does not consider that Peary's latest statement in any way affects Cook's claims.

### Oddfellows May Build.

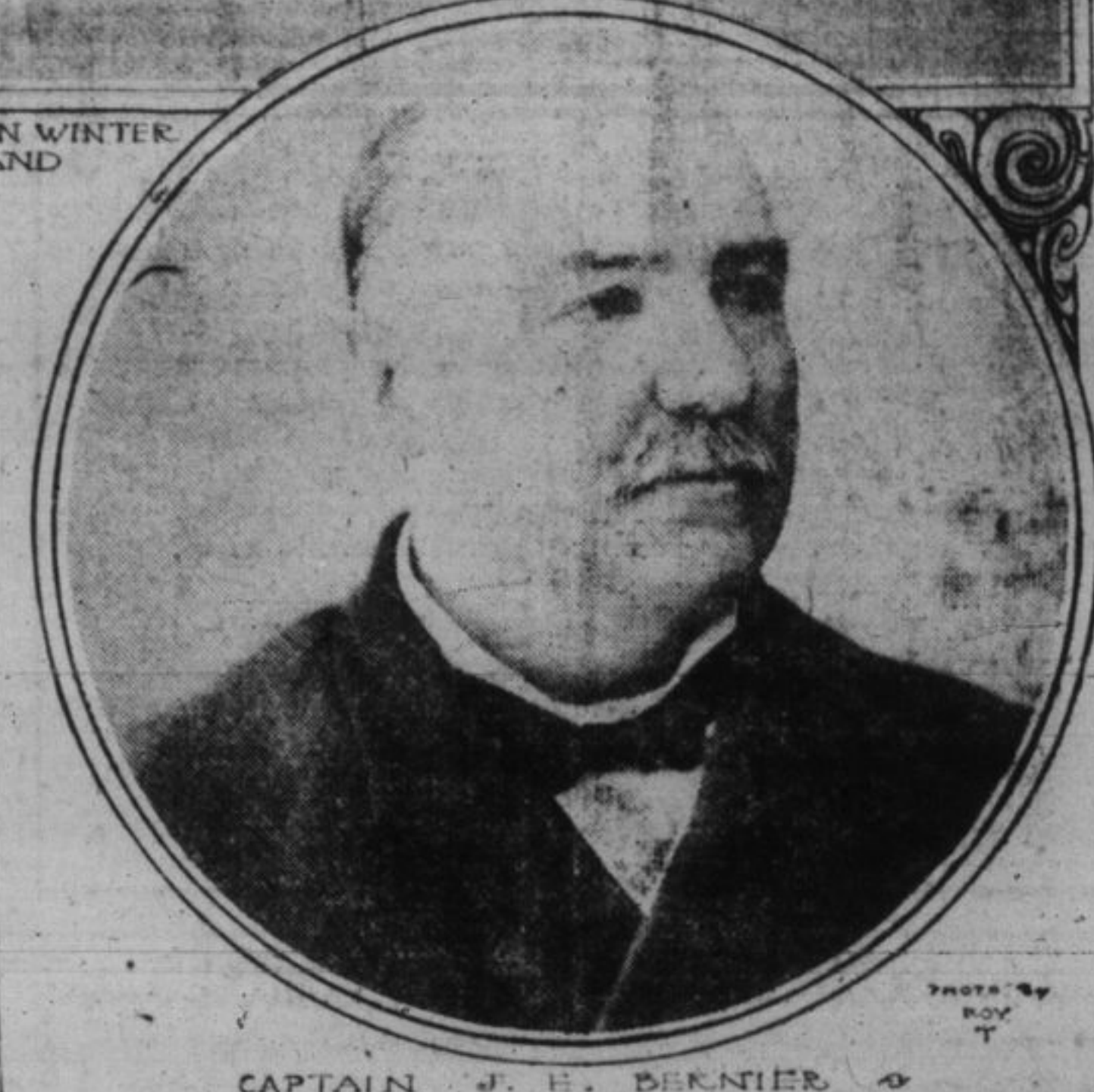
